




OUR FASCINATING FAITH - Archangels Michael, Gabriel & Raphael (Sept. 29) According to the Catechism of the Catholic Church, angels exist to glorify and serve God and to help with God's plan for salvation by cooperating with our good deeds. They can help us if we collaborate with them for the glory of God. Our Christian tradition has designated a hierarchy of nine categories among the celestial beings whom we call angels. The seraphs are the first and the nearest to God, and the angels are the last and the nearest to human beings. Between the seraphs and angels, in order of hierarchy, are the cherubim and thrones, who together with the seraphs are dedicated to praising and loving God. The dominations, virtues and powers are in charge of arranging the universe. Next are the pringcipals and the archangels, who together with the angels care for and guide human beings. In this hierarchy of closeness to God, the archangels are next to last in power, although they are the most sought after because of their responsibility to care for the four cardinal points of creation. According to Hebraic tradition, there are seven archangels (Tobias 12:15) of which holy scripture mentions only three by name: Michael ("Who is like God?"), Gabriel ("strong one of God"), and Rafael (God heals").



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Gospel Meditation

Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

A life-long Catholic friend of mine recently mumbled to me, "I can't stand all these converts to the faith. They're always rocking the boat." It surprised me because he is dedicated to evangelization, and yet he struggles with openness to new Catholics. It made me realize how easily I close my heart to those whom I perceive to be outsiders who become new members of the Catholic community. Almost unconsciously I reduce the world to the categories of "us" and "them." The result is that meaningful community silently shrinks in my life. Don't we all do that to some degree?

This week Jesus' punchy parable about the two sons blows up that black and white world. One son said he wouldn't get to work, and then did. The other said he would, and then he did not. "Which did the will of his father?" asks the Lord. Like so many of us, in identifying the first as the answer, the religious authorities manifest hidden hypocrisy in refusing to follow Jesus. They — like us — intuit the correct path but simply won't do it. The tax collectors and prostitutes are indeed following Jesus and thereby getting to work in the kingdom of God. Everyone is called to do God's will regardless of the labels we may apply to them.

This week let's reject the convenient but damaging categories of "insiders" and "outsiders." Instead, let's embrace a grateful attitude that Jesus is calling fallen, weak, and broken men and women like you and me. Then we begin to see that the tax collectors and prostitutes aren't *them*. They are us. And Jesus wants all of *us* working in his boat, no matter the rocking.





The Vineyard

The second son never showed up to the vineyard. Did he get lost? Did he get tired? Did he not know where to begin?

When it comes right down to it, good intentions amount to very little. We all know this, don't we? "Show me, don't tell me." "I'll believe it when I see it." It's as true in the workplace and in relationships as it is in the life of the Christian disciple.

It doesn't matter if we *intend* to work in the vineyard. It doesn't matter if we promise to, if we think about it a lot, or if we make grand plans for what we will accomplish there. None of that matters if we don't show up. Before we show up, we have to find the way.

Showing up is the whole point. The work is the point, not the intention.

But all this begs the question: what does the *work* mean for us as baptized Catholics in the modern world? Spending our Saturdays in soup kitchens and homeless shelters? Standing on a street corner shouting out the words of the Gospel?

Our baptismal call is to the vineyard. Where is our vineyard? How do we show up? We are ready, Lord, we say. We intend to work. But where do we go?

My vineyard is not your vineyard, and so it's not my place to tell you how to get there. I am glad you want to go, but you'll have to find your own way, just like I will. But I can tell you this: only one voice will lead you there. If you listen to it, you will find your vineyard.

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained


Question:

Can anyone offer the Anointing of the Sick to a sick or dying person, or is that only something a priest can do?

Answer:

The Letter of James speaks to us of the ancient tradition of a special anointing and blessing of those who are sick: "Is there anyone sick among you? Let him send for the presbyters of the Church and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord ... If he has committed any sins, they will be forgiven him" (5:14, 15b). This passage forms the foundation for the theology of the sacrament that we call "Anointing of the Sick." In keeping with what we read in the Letter of James and the ancient tradition of the Church, the anointing of a person of who sick or dying many only be performed by a priest or bishop.

Although deacons and other members of the Church are not able to celebrate the sacrament with a person who is sick, we can read Sacred Scripture and pray with and for those who are ill. Resources like the Book of Blessings also contain special blessings that can be celebrated by deacons or lay ministers. In the end, we want to be sure that we show a special care and concern for the sick, helping them to always experience God's loving comfort through made tangible through our acts of charity and service.



RAYERS National Eucharistic Revival Supplement – September 2023

Brothers and Sisters in Christ, the US Bishops have asked the whole Church to participate in the National Eucharistic Revival, as though we were the disciples walking with Jesus on the Road to Emmaus: Their hearts were burning within them!

THEME FOR SEPTEMBER: THE BLESSINGS OF EUCHARISTIC FAITH

Eucharistic Saint

St. John Neumann (1811-1860). The practice of adoring the Eucharist for forty hours straight [roughly the length of His Passion] originated with this great Eucharistic saint when he was Bishop of Philadelphia from 1852-60. It is said that he heard the divine voice after the Lord miraculously saved him from a fire. The Lord told him that He would release graces like flames in the diocese if the bishop would institute this practice. Thus was born the 40 Hours Devotion.

Back to Basics

SOURCE AND SUMMIT: The Catechism calls the Eucharist "the source and summit of the Christian life." A source is the origin of everything, and in this sense, our whole sacramental system derives from the Eucharist, which we call the Blessed Sacrament for that reason.



A summit is the *culmination* of everything, which is why we can say that without the Eucharist, we would not even have a Church. This is how the *Catechism* described the unique gift of the Eucharist within the life of the Church:

"The other sacraments, and indeed all ecclesiastical ministries and works of the apostolate, are bound up with the Eucharist and are oriented toward it. For in the blessed Eucharist is contained the whole spiritual good of the Church, namely Christ himself, our Pasch." (CCC, 1324)

Calls to Action

The Virtue of Reverence – Praying with a reverent heart obtains special graces from the Lord whenever we make intercessions in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament.

Practice – "The venerable practice of genuflecting before the Blessed Sacrament... requires that it be performed in a recollected way in order that the heart may bow before God in profound reverence." ~ Congregation for the Sacraments and Divine Worship, Inaestimabile Donum (1980), 26.

"If we but paused for a moment to consider attentively what takes place in this Sacrament, I am sure that the thought of Christ's love for us would transform the coldness of our hearts into a fire of love and gratitude." ~St. Angela of Foligno

Faith Formation Companion to Prayers in the Pew™

→ MONTHLY SYNOPSIS ←

September 2023 – The month of September is full of magnificent feast days of saints. So let us, like them, make every attempt to be faithful to our Eucharistic devotions and to be mindful of the sick and underprivileged in our midst. It's not politicians who make the greatest contributions to culture – it's people who strive to be saints!

THE DIVINE PRAISES

Blasphemy is prohibited by the Second Commandment: "You shall not take the name of the Lord your God in vain". That commandment goes on to add, "For the Lord will not leave unpunished him who takes his name in vain" (Exodus 20:7).

In response to the increase in blasphemy in his day (end of the 1700s), an Italian Jesuit named Luigi Felici wrote the litany we now know as "The Divine Praises."

His original version consisted only of eight short phrases in praise of the Holy Trinity and the saints and angels, but subsequent popes added phrases to fill out the list.

Now, fourteen praises comprise this magnificent devotional prayer of the Church. The number fourteen has a biblical character to it – twice the perfect number seven. Soon after Fr. Felici composed them, the Divine Praises became a standard element of the Eucharistic Adoration and Benediction service.

The Church always counters the devil's blasphemies with blessings. This is why each of the divine praises begins with the words, "Blessed be...." In other words, the faithful express our praises as a wish that God will be blessed by all people at all times and that this praise may touch all of creation and be brought to fruition through our prayers.

Here are the fourteen Divine Praises that we may pray at any time:

Blessed be God.

Blessed be his Holy Name.

Blessed be Jesus Christ, true God and true man.

Blessed be the name of Jesus.

Blessed be his Most Sacred Heart.

Blessed be his Most Precious Blood.

Blessed be Jesus in the Most Holy Sacrament of the altar.

Blessed be the Holy Spirit the Paraclete.

Blessed be the great Mother of God, Mary Most Holy.

Blessed be her holy and Immaculate Conception.

Blessed be her glorious Assumption.

Blessed be the name of Mary, Virgin and Mother.

Blessed be St Joseph, her most chaste spouse.

Blessed be God in his Angels and in his Saints.

Amen.

Note that the subjects of the Divine Praises proceed hierarchically: the Trinity, God the Father, Jesus and His attributes, and the Holy Spirit. Then come the Blessed Virgin Mary with St. Joseph and all the angels and saints finishing the list.

There are also two Marian doctrines in this list which appear in chronological order: the Immaculate Conception (decreed by Pope Pius IX in 1854) and Our Lady's Assumption (by Pope Pius XII in 1950). Like all things Catholic, there are good reasons for everything we believe and practice!

SPIRITUAL CHALLENGE

This month, let us challenge ourselves to exercise daily vigilance through the time-tested practice of a simple examination of conscience at the end of each day before going to bed. Also, during this year of Eucharistic Renewal, try to spend some time in silent prayer at church or in Eucharistic Adoration as you are able. Even a ten minute visit before the Lord is of immense value!

BIBLE BASICS -



Isaiah 6:2-4 Seraphim were stationed above; each of them had six wings: with two they covered their faces, with two they covered their

feet, and with two they hovered. One cried out to the other: 'Holy, holy, holy is the LORD of hosts! All the earth is filled with his glory!' At the sound of that cry, the frame of the door shook and the house was filled with smoke.

CATECHISM CONNECTION -



2096 Adoration is the first act of the virtue of religion. To adore God is to acknowledge him as God, as the Creator and Savior, the Lord and Master of everything that exists, as

infinite and merciful Love. 'You shall worship the Lord your God, and him only shall you serve,' says Jesus, citing *Deuteronomy*.

FAITH FUNDAMENTALS -

Worship and Veneration

The Catechism tells us that man owes worship to God as a sacred duty (CCC, 2095), and in obedience to the First Commandment (Ex 20:5, Lk 4:8), we worship God alone! The Catholic liturgies, especially the Eucharist, are the primary and public acts of divine worship.

Yet, Catholics are falsely accused of worshipping Mary, the saints, and angels because we pray to them. But our relationship with the holy ones of God is not worship or idolatry. It is veneration – love, esteem, respect, and friendship.

We recognize that God has given the saints and angels special influence in heaven, and from their place in glory, they show concern for our welfare. Christ shares His intercessory power with them and allows them to be spiritual intermediaries for our benefit. We can have recourse to them for all of our needs, both material and spiritual.

Veneration of the saints increases our friendship with the holy ones; they, in turn, strengthen our own connection to God through their intercession for us.

We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.










The Department of Homeland Security recently announced it is almost time to re-register for those who have Temporary Protected Status (TPS) designation for El Salvador, Honduras, Nepal, and Nicaragua. The TPS extension would last for 18 months. TPS beneficiaries must re-register for TPS and apply to renew their Employment Authorization Document if they would like work permits that will last until January 2025. It is highly encouraged that you contact a trusted immigration attorney or Catholic Immigration Services soon to learn more about the process. 
