

## The Real Presence of Christ

By the power of the Holy Spirit, Christ is present in the proclamation of God's Word, in the Eucharistic assembly, in the person of the priest, but above all and in a wholly unique manner in the Eucharist. This presence is called 'real'-by which is not intended to exclude the other types of presence as if they could not be 'real' too, but because it is presence in the fullest sense: that is to say, it is a substantial presence by which Christ, God and man, makes himself wholly

and entirely present" (CCC, no. 1374, citing Pope Paul VI, Mystery of Faith, no. 39).

Since the Middle Ages, the change of bread and wine into the Body and Blood of Christ has been called "transubstantiation." This means that the substance of the bread and wine is changed into the substance of the Body and Blood of Christ. The appearances of bread and wine remain (color, shape, weight, chemical composition), but the underlying reality—that is, the substance—is now the Body and Blood of Christ.

The Real Presence of Jesus Christ endures in the consecrated elements even after the Mass is ended. Once Communion has been distributed, any remaining hosts are placed in the tabernacle. If any of the Precious Blood remains, it is reverently consumed. The hosts are reserved to provide Communion for the sick, Viaticum (Communion

for the dying), and to allow the faithful to worship Christ in the reserved Sacrament and to pray in his presence. As a sign of adoration, Latin Catholics genuflect to the Real Presence of Jesus Christ in the tabernacle or genuflect or kneel when the Blessed Sacrament is exposed for prayer. Eastern Catholics show their reverence by a profound bow rather than a genuflection: "It is for this reason the tabernacle should be located in an especially worthy place in the Church and should

be constructed in such a way that it emphasizes and manifests the truth of the real presence of Christ in the Blessed Sacrament" (CCC, no. 1379).

With the passage of time, reverent reflection led the Church to enrich its Eucharistic devotion. Faith that Jesus is truly present in the Sacrament led believers to worship Christ dwelling with us permanently in the Sacrament. Wherever the Sacrament is, there is Christ, who is our Lord and our God. Such worship is expressed in many ways: in genuflection, in adoration of the Eucharist, and in the many forms of Eucharistic devotion that faith has nourished.

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The Eucharistic Liturgy contains the entire treasure
of the Church since it makes present the Paschal
Mystery, the central event of salvation. Eucharistic
adoration and devotion flow from and lead to the

Eucharistic Liturgy, the Mass.

#### MADE RIGHT BEFORE GOD

Although the opening lines of today's first reading claim that the Lord "knows no favorites" (Sirach 35:15) and is "not unduly partial toward the weak" (35:16), the remainder of the passage makes it clear that the Lord does indeed pay special attention to the weak, the oppressed, and the orphans and widows. The psalmist reiterates: "The Lord hears the cry of the poor" (see Psalm 34:18). In the Gospel, Jesus claims that a tax collector is more justified in his prayer for mercy than the Pharisee, whose prayer was an account of his own righteous deeds. Jesus' point could not have been clearer: tax collectors in the Jewish society of Jesus' day were not just lowly; they were considered outcasts and cheaters. They collected taxes for the hated Romans and almost certainly collected enough to assure a generous income for themselves. Tax collectors were among society's outcasts; didn't this one just admit his own sinfulness? How could a tax collector be "justified" (that is, made right) before God, while the Pharisee was not? Why would God even listen to the prayer of a tax collector? This surely was a surprise, upsetting common assumptions about righteousness. Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co







#### GOD'S VISION

In these waning weeks of the liturgical year, our readings present us with God's vision for the world, in which the prayer of the lowly pierces the clouds and the humble are exalted in God's sight. It is not always easy to follow Jesus, to stand for justice, share love, and bring peace when there is so much division, poverty, loneliness, and pain in our homes, workplaces, cities, and world. We do not stand alone, however. We who are disciples and servants are assured that the Lord will hear our petitions, stand by us, and give us strength as we strive to bear witness to the good news of salvation.

#### THE LORD HEARS THE CRY OF THE POOR

It is easy for those who do not face food insecurity or homelessness to turn a deaf ear to those who struggle for survival. We may regularly drive by the street corner and ignore the person who stands there each day asking for help. We might see the commercial on TV, hear the plea on the radio or in our churches, and yet not let the message in, ignoring not only the need, but the people whose needs are great. The prophet Sirach and the psalmist tell us that the Lord is not like us—God hears the cries of the oppressed, the orphan and widow, the vulnerable among us. As Christian disciples we are called to become more like our loving, compassionate God who hears the cry of the poor.

#### DO WE?

Jesus' parable in today's Gospel tells the story of two people. The Pharisee is puffed up with his own importance. His prayer is more a statement of self-justification in which he positions himself as being above the rest of humanity. So much so that he prays to himself, thanking God that he is so much better than everyone else! The tax collector on the other hand raises his eyes to God and acknowledges his sinfulness. He is the one Jesus says is justified, exalted in God's sight. What about us? Are we so puffed up with our own importance, so caught up in the stuff of our daily lives that we fail to recognize our failings or to see the needs of the people around us? This week, let us ask the Lord to

pierce our hearts, help us to genuinely admit our failings, and truly live as followers of the one who gave his life so that all might live life to the fullest. God hears the cries of the weakest and relies on us to respond.

#### LA VISIÓN DE DIOS

En estas últimas semanas del año litúrgico, nuestras lecturas nos presentan la visión de Dios para el mundo, en la que la oración de los humildes atraviesa las nubes y los humildes son exaltados a los ojos de Dios. No siempre es fácil seguir a Jesús, defender la justicia, compartir el amor y traer la paz cuando hay tanta división, pobreza, soledad y dolor en nuestros hogares, lugares de trabajo, ciudades y el mundo. Sin embargo, no estamos solos. Los que somos discípulos y servidores tenemos la seguridad de que el Señor escuchará nuestras peticiones, nos apoyará y nos dará fuerza mientras nos esforzamos por dar testimonio de la buena noticia de la salvación.

#### EL SEÑOR ESCUCHA EL CLAMOR DE LOS POBRES

Es fácil que quienes no se enfrentan a la inseguridad alimentaria o a la falta de vivienda hagan oídos sordos a quienes luchan por sobrevivir. Puede que pasemos regularmente por la esquina de la calle e ignoremos a la persona que está allí cada día pidiendo ayuda. Puede que veamos el anuncio en la televisión, que oigamos la petición en la radio o en nuestras iglesias y, sin embargo, no dejemos entrar el mensaje, ignorando no sólo la necesidad, sino a las personas cuyas necesidades son grandes. El profeta Eclesiástico y el salmista nos dicen que el Señor no es como nosotros: Dios escucha los gritos de los oprimidos, los huérfanos y las viudas, los vulnerables entre nosotros. Como discípulos cristianos estamos llamados a parecernos más a nuestro Dios amoroso y compasivo que escucha el clamor de los pobres.

#### ¿LO HACEMOS?

La parábola de Jesús en el Evangelio de hoy cuenta la historia de dos personas. El fariseo se enorgullece de su propia importancia. Su oración es más bien una declaración de auto justificación en la que se sitúa por encima del resto de la humanidad. Tanto es así que reza para sí mismo, dando gracias a Dios por ser mucho mejor que los demás. El recaudador de impuestos, por el contrario, levanta los ojos hacia Dios y reconoce su pecaminosidad. Él es el que Jesús dice que está justificado, exaltado a los ojos de Dios. ¿Y nosotros? ¿Estamos tan engreídos con nuestra propia importancia, tan atrapados en las cosas de nuestra vida diaria que no reconocemos nuestros fallos ni vemos las necesidades de la gente que nos rodea? Esta semana, pidamos al Señor que nos atraviese el corazón, que nos ayude a reconocer de verdad nuestros fallos y a vivir realmente como seguidores de aquel

que dio su vida para que todos pudieran vivir en plenitud. Dios escucha los gritos de los más débiles y confía en nuestra respuesta.
