





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Gospel Meditation

Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

Last Easter season a new convert to Catholicism at my parish asked me with a grave tone in her voice: "Why do we call priests 'father' if Jesus says, 'Call no man on earth your father, for you have one Father, who is in heaven'?" Thinking myself clever, I asked, "Do you think it's okay to call someone your 'teacher' or 'mister' or 'dad'?" She said, "Yes, I do." I responded, "Well, Jesus seems to forbid that, too. So, it's obviously hyperbole that he's using." She thought for a moment and declared, "Then I will stop using those words, too!" And she walked away. Not the outcome I was seeking.

We shouldn't be too hasty in dismissing this complaint voiced by many non-Catholics. The expression "father" for ordained priests is not honorary for the individual man. The priest's fatherhood doesn't begin or end in him at all. Rather, the title "father" indicates that he is a sacramental sign of God's Fatherhood revealed in Jesus. I can tell you, as a very unworthy bearer of that title, we should give and receive that title with some trepidation (because of God's awesomeness) and with a little sense of humor (because of the lowliness of the men with the title).

The longer I'm a priest, the more I'm comfortable with people not using the title "father" and just calling me "John." After all, only God is Father in the truest sense. At the same time, Jesus has brought the Father close to us, very close. We honor this closeness in some men with the title "father." Who are the priests in your life whom Christ has sent to you? How wonderful that Christ has surrounded us with humble signs of his Father's love. It's good to celebrate that love with gratitude for the priests in our lives. — Father John Muir

A Heavy Burden, Hard to Carry

"Mommy, you haven't been making any sacrifices."

My daughter was peering through the little opening in the plastic cover of the "sacrifice jar" we made for Lent this year. The repurposed oatmeal container, jazzed up with glitter glue and pictures of St. Therese of Lisieux, was more than half-filled with little slips of paper bearing descriptions of the various sacrifices family members had made for one another.

But she was right: every piece of paper bore the childlike scrawl of herself and her brother. I had not added anything to the sacrifice jar.

"If I wrote down every sacrifice I made for you in just a single day, the jar would explode," I retorted, and even though my daughter giggled, I instantly regretted the comment, sighing as I realized I did it again. I let a snide, self-pitying thought form on my lips and make its way into the world because for a brief moment I thought someone didn't appreciate my (imagine me sniffing injuredly here) hard work.

We sneer at the scribes and the Pharisees as Jesus describes them in the Gospel, lengthening their phylacteries and coveting the places of honor. But then I remember: nobody starts out *meaning* to be a jerk.

We want to do good things. We try to be holy. But it's hard, that burden weighs heavy on our back.

So, we murmur about it here and there. We stop to catch our breath. We glimpse other people looking at our burden with approval and admiration, and we breathe a little harder, groan a little deeper. And somewhere along the way the burden becomes an idol and our labor a performance. We dare not ask for help bearing it, for we prize too greatly the sweat of our own brow.

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

Why do some sacraments leave a character or mark on the soul? Don't all sacraments affect the soul?

Answer:

All sacraments mediate grace and connect us to Christ and to the Church. Some sustain us in our faith journey, while others help us heal from the effects of sin. Each one offers a share in God's life, giving us what we need to be faithful followers of Jesus. But some sacraments change us in ways that are irreversible. The three sacraments that leave a character are Baptism, Confirmation, and Holy Orders. We are literally different people because of the effect of the grace of those sacraments. We are changed at the core of our being in such a fundamental way that we can not go back to what we once were.

In Baptism, we are freed from original sin, initiated into the Body of Christ as adopted sons and daughters. In Confirmation, we are given the fullness of God's Spirit, sealed in his grace and gifted with what we need to live a Christian life. In Holy Orders, a priest is marked as an 'alter Christus,' another Christ, and is once and forever a priest who offers sacrifice, forgives sin, and acts in the person of Christ. In these three sacraments, we are conformed more closely to Christ, reflecting his love and truth.



National Fucharistic Revival Supplement – November 2023

Dear friends, following the path of the National Eucharistic Revival set for us by our Bishops, we pray that the whole Church in heaven and on earth will be united in this most Blessed Sacrament.



Eucharistic Saint

St. Juliana of Liège (d. 1258). This Belgian nun received mystical visions urging her to promote a new feast of the Eucharist. She labored for twenty years to foster this devotion in her local church. Six years after her death, an Archdeacon of her diocese was elected Pope Urban IV, who then authorized the feast of Corpus Christi for the Universal Church.

Back to Basics

SACRAMENTAL CONFESSION: If the Eucharistic Revival is to bear any real fruit, it must be accompanied by a revival of Confession. The Church's canon law, Catechism, and dozens of other Church documents make this clear:



"Anyone who is conscious of grave sin may not celebrate Mass or receive the Body of the Lord without previously having been to sacramental confession, unless there is a grave reason and there is no opportunity to confess." ~ Code of Canon Law (1985), 916.

Keep in mind that the Church doesn't require us to be saints to receive the Eucharist! It only asks us to receive the Lord's Body and Blood "worthily" (1 Cor 11:27).

Calls to Action



Repentance – A necessary condition for entering the Kingdom of Heaven is repentance for our sins. Remember, these were the first words of Our Lord in His public ministry: "Repent and believe!" (Mk 1:15).

Practice – We must have recourse to the saints and angels in order to approach the Eucharist worthily. Each of us has a guardian angel who assists us at Mass, and so do our patron saints. If we don't have a patron saint, we can choose a particular saint who will help us worship Christ in the Blessed Sacrament with true faith!

"Let no one approach this Sacrament with indifference. Let no one be faint-hearted; rather let everyone have burning hearts, all fervent... For we are pilgrims on our way to heaven." ~ St. John Chrysostom

Faith Formation Companion to Prayers in the Pew™

→ MONTHLY SYNOPSIS ←

November 2023 – Catholics take it as a solemn obligation to pray for those who are sick and also for those who have gone before us to eternal life. The month of November begins with the Church's solemn remembrance of our dear faithful departed on All Souls Day. Yet, each Catholic Mass commemorates the death of our Lord, who by dying destroyed death itself.

PRAYER FOR THE SICK

It is a little-known fact that the Catholic Church is largely responsible for what today we call *hospitals*. The Latin word *hospes* means "guest" or "traveler", and it was the work of the Church – from the very beginning – to provide hospitality and charity to those who were in need of it.

What was the motivation for Christians to provide healthcare to others? Simply, the words of Jesus: "I was ill and you cared for me, in prison and you visited me" (Matthew 25:36).

Many great saints like St. Basil, St. Jerome, and St. Cyprian established hospitals in their areas for care of the sick and suffering. The Council of Nicea (325 AD) even ordered that every city which had a cathedral should also have a hospital, and with the passing of centuries, lay and religious orders formed in the Church that were dedicated exclusively to the care of the sick.

THE SCHOOL OF SAINTS-



"God has no need of your money, but the poor have. You give it to the poor, and God receives it." ~ St. Augustine

"The secret of happiness is to live moment by moment and to thank God for all that He, in His goodness, sends to us day after day." ~ St. Gianna Beretta Molla The average Christian who is not a healthcare professional may not be able to care directly for the sick and suffering, but we can all pray for the sick as one of our Christian works of mercy. The Church gives us a simple *Prayer for the Sick* in the following words that we may pray any time we are concerned about the health and wellbeing of another:

Father in heaven, grant N. comfort in his/her suffering. Give him (her) courage when afraid, patience when afflicted, hope when dejected, and when alone, assure him (her) of the prayerful support of your holy people. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Since sickness is part of a fallen world and will always be with us, we often need to ask for peace of heart to deal with it. Many times illness is stronger than we are, but let us never forget St. Paul's consoling words to the Philippians:

"Have no anxiety at all, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, make your requests known to God. Then the peace of God that surpasses all understanding will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:6-7).

SPIRITUAL CHALLENGE

In the month of All Souls, our challenge is to identify those around us who suffer in any way and ask them to offer their sufferings for the Holy Souls in Purgatory and for the redemption of the world.

Reach out to them if possible, even if it is just a word of support and sympathy. Most importantly, include them in your prayers and the prayers of your family so that they may receive the spiritual consolation the Church provides.



FAITH FUNDAMENTALS

The Corporal Works of Mercy

The term "corporal" signifies bodily needs, and these works of mercy are anything that helps people overcome their material sufferings of this world. The Church's description of the Corporal Works of Mercy comes directly from the famous passage of the Sheep and Goats in Matthew 25, where Jesus claims that "whatever you did for one of these least brothers of mine, you did for me" (Matthew 25:40).

The Church's list of the seven Corporal Works of Mercy:

- To feed the hungry
- 2. To give drink to the thirsty
- 3. To clothe the naked
- 4. To visit the imprisoned
- 5. To shelter the homeless
- 6. To visit the sick
- 7. To bury the dead

We can never practice these good works too often.

CATECHISM CONNECTION -



2447 The works of mercy are charitable actions by which we come to the aid of our neighbor in his spiritual and bodily necessities. Instructing, advising, consoling, comfort-

ing are spiritual works of mercy, as are forgiving and bearing wrongs patiently. The corporal works of mercy consist especially in feeding the hungry, sheltering the homeless, clothing the naked, visiting the sick and imprisoned, and burying the dead. Among all these, giving alms to the poor is one of the chief witnesses

to fraternal charity: it is also a work of justice pleasing to God.



To the Catholic Community in Arkansas,

Blessed Stanley Rother Mission was formally established as a Catholic community in the small northwest Arkansas town of Decatur just over six years ago. The dedication took place on September 24, the day after Blessed Stanley Rother was beatified in Oklahoma City. He is the first beatified martyr of the United States and the first beatified martyr of Guatemala.

Blessed Stanley Rother Mission has around 80 members, including people from Guatemala, El Salvador and Mexico. As a mission, it is attended by Fr. "Samy," the pastor of St. Joseph Church in Tontitown. They have a Saturday evening Mass in a well-worn building that formerly served as a Baptist church. People crowd into the seven rows of pews and a few extra folding chairs. They have an outdated air conditioning and heating unit that does not cool or heat very well.

When Blessed Stanley Rother Mission was dedicated, I told those present that "we are not dedicating a church building today. What we are doing is establishing you formally as a community. After all, the Church is the people, not the building." We all know, though, that we need an adequate place to gather as a community for Mass, reconciliation, faith formation, and all the other parish activities that bring us closer to our Lord and sustain us in our Catholic faith.

This year, Blessed Stanley Rother Mission has been selected as our One Church partner for the next 12 months. With a one-time financial boost from everyone in our diocese – parishes and individual supporters – we can help them make much-needed improvements to their church building and hall for their growing community.
