



THE END OF DAYS

As we prepare for next Sunday's feast of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe, we hear descriptions of dire and catastrophic events. Sometimes it seems as though we ourselves are living in the end times, when life as we currently know it will cease for everyone. In answer to what must have been a fearful question, Jesus does not sugarcoat his foretelling of future days. Nor does the Old Testament prophet Malachi flinch from his pronouncements upon an evil world. Saint Paul, still writing to the Thessalonians, warns them prophetically against succumbing to "The End Is Near" syndrome—indolence in the face of the final days. However, both Jesus and Malachi speak of the recompense for living a just life—healing and vindication. Our Psalm 98, typically associated with Christmastime, helps us to rejoice for the King who is coming to rule with justice.

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TODAY'S READINGS

First Reading — There will arise the sun of justice with its healing rays (Malachi 3:19-20a).

Psalm — The Lord comes to rule the earth with justice (Psalm 98).

Second Reading — Paul speaks of his hard work among the Thessalonians (2 Thessalonians 3:7-12).

Gospel — Jesus foretells the destruction of Jerusalem, the persecution of his followers. But their perseverance will be their salvation (Luke 21:5-19).

For more than 50 years, the Catholic Campaign for Human Development (CCHD) has supported organizations that combat poverty and improve the lives of people in communities across the United States. From empowering immigrants in towns along the southern border to advocating for improved housing and educational opportunities in northern and midwestern cities, CCHD-funded groups tackle a wide range of economic and social justice challenges that affect local communities in rural and urban areas.

In areas of Tennessee where coal-mining operations and landfills have caused water pollution and other environmental damage, Statewide Organizing for Community eMpowerment (SOCM) works with governments and regulatory agencies to limit hazardous waste disposal in landfills and to require environmental cleanup as part of the permitting process for new business operations.

Environmental damage affects all of us, most especially low-income people who are affected by water pollution resulting from mineral extraction, lack of access to healthy foods in urban “food deserts,” and natural disasters caused by climate change. The Church teaches that “the natural environment is

a collective good, the patrimony of all humanity and the responsibility of everyone” (Pope Francis, *Laudato Si’*, no. 95). Since the release of *Laudato Si’* in 2015, CCHD has invested more than \$4.3 million in organizations that work to protect the environment and combat pollution. When you support CCHD, you support organizations that work to protect the air, soil, and water for all the members of their communities.



Por más de 50 años, la Campaña Católica para el Desarrollo Humano (CCHD) ha apoyado a organizaciones que luchan contra la pobreza y mejoran la vida de las personas en comunidades en Estados Unidos. Desde capacitar a los inmigrantes en los pueblos a lo largo de la frontera sur hasta abogar por mejores oportunidades para la vivienda y la educación en ciudades del norte y del medio oeste, los grupos financiados por CCHD se enfrentan a una gran cantidad de desafíos económicos y de justicia social que afectan a las comunidades locales en áreas urbanas y rurales.

En áreas de Tennessee, en donde las operaciones para la extracción del carbón y para el relleno sanitario han causado la contaminación del agua y otros daños ambientales, el Statewide Organizing for Community eMpowerment (SOCM) trabaja con el gobierno y las agencias reguladoras a fin de limitar la eliminación de desechos peligrosos en los rellenos sanitarios y para exigir la limpieza ambiental como parte del proceso para la obtención de permisos en las nuevas operaciones comerciales.

El daño ambiental nos afecta a todos, pero especialmente a las personas de bajos recursos quienes son afectadas por la contaminación del agua que resulta de la extracción del mineral, por la falta de acceso a alimentos saludables en los “desiertos alimentarios” urbanos y los desastres naturales causados por el cambio climático. La Iglesia enseña que “El medio ambiente es un bien colectivo,

patrimonio de toda la humanidad y responsabilidad de todos” (Papa Francisco, *Laudato Si'*, no. 95). Desde la publicación de *Laudato Si'* en el 2015, CCHD ha invertido más de \$4.3 millones en organizaciones que trabajan para proteger el ambiente y combatir la contaminación. Cuando ustedes apoyan a CCHD, están apoyando a organizaciones que trabajan para proteger el aire, el suelo y el agua para todos los miembros de sus comunidades.

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
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St. Vincent de Paul Christmas Program

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THE WORK OF DISCIPLESHIP

It is easy to go through life non-reflectively, living the routines of our days and weeks without giving much thought to the larger questions of meaning, purpose, and calling. We may know we need to change but put it off, thinking we'll love, serve, and care more in the future. We may face trial personally and be weary of trying to live as we know we should. We witness discord, violence, and division and it may feel that it is the end of the world. Today's readings urge us to put laziness, fear, or distraction aside and get about the work of discipleship with the assurance that the Lord will provide what we need as we do so.

THE SUN OF JUSTICE WILL ARISE

It may seem as though Jesus is talking directly to us in today's Gospel. While it is always true that the Gospel speaks across time and space, today's message feels particularly appropriate as we near the end of another year that has been filled with pandemic, political division, international tension, and economic concerns. Christ reigns over all these things, and as Christians, we hold firm in the belief that we will as well. We must take the long view—the truly long view of eternity—as we meet the challenges of our time. The sun of justice will arise. All will be well.

NOT A HAIR ON YOUR HEAD WILL BE DESTROYED. PERSEVERE.

The message of the Gospel is not abstract, nor are we distant hearers of its message. We face choices every day about how we will live, what we will or won't do, how seriously we will take Christ's call to live the truth of the gospel. At times, the choices we face seem inconsequential: will we sit on the sofa night after night, or choose to spend time with family or serve in our parish? Will we get up for Mass on Sunday morning ready to praise God and be part of our faith community, or drag ourselves there, grumbling every step of the way (or not go at all)? Choices such as these are of consequence of course, not only because each decision matters, but the patterns we establish in our lives are rooted in the cumulative weight of the choices we make. We may be called upon to make harder choices and must be prepared to do so. Jesus tells us to persevere. By doing so, we will secure our lives.

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LA TRABAJO DEL DISCIPULADO

Es fácil pasar por la vida sin reflexionar, viviendo las rutinas de nuestros días y semanas sin pensar mucho en las cuestiones más amplias de significado, propósito y vocación. Puede que sepamos que necesitamos cambiar, pero lo posponemos, pensando que amaremos, serviremos y nos preocuparemos más en el futuro. Puede que nos enfrentemos personalmente a las pruebas y nos cansemos de intentar vivir como sabemos que deberíamos. Somos testigos de la discordia, la violencia y la división y podemos sentir que es el fin del mundo. Las lecturas de hoy nos instan a dejar de lado la pereza, el miedo o la distracción y a ponernos a trabajar en el discipulado con la seguridad de que el Señor nos proporcionará lo que necesitamos mientras lo hacemos.

EL SOL DE LA JUSTICIA SALDRÁ

Puede parecer que Jesús se dirige directamente a nosotros en el Evangelio de hoy. Aunque siempre es cierto que el Evangelio habla a través del tiempo y el espacio, el mensaje de hoy se siente especialmente apropiado cuando nos acercamos al final de otro año que ha estado lleno de pandemias, divisiones políticas, tensiones internacionales y preocupaciones económicas. Cristo reina sobre todas estas cosas y, como cristianos, nos mantenemos firmes en la creencia de que nosotros también lo haremos. Debemos tener una visión a largo plazo —la verdadera visión a largo plazo de la eternidad— para hacer frente a los desafíos de nuestro tiempo. El sol de la justicia saldrá. Todo saldrá bien.

NO SE DESTRUIRÁ NI UN PELO DE TU CABEZA. PERSEVERE.

El mensaje del Evangelio no es abstracto, ni nosotros somos oyentes distantes de su mensaje. Cada día nos enfrentamos a decisiones sobre cómo vamos a vivir, qué vamos a hacer o no, hasta qué punto vamos a tomarnos en serio la llamada de Cristo a vivir la verdad del Evangelio. A veces, las decisiones que tomamos parecen intrascendentes: ¿nos sentaremos en el sofá noche tras noche, o elegiremos pasar tiempo con la familia o servir en nuestra parroquia? ¿Nos levantaremos para ir a misa el domingo por la mañana dispuestos a alabar a Dios y a formar parte de nuestra comunidad de fe, o nos arrastraremos hasta allí, refunfuñando a cada paso (o no iremos en absoluto)? Este tipo de elecciones tienen consecuencias, por supuesto, no sólo porque cada decisión es importante, sino porque los patrones que establecemos en nuestras vidas se basan en el peso acumulado de las elecciones que hacemos. Puede que se nos pida que tomemos decisiones más difíciles y debemos estar preparados para ello. Jesús nos dice que perseveremos. Al hacerlo, aseguraremos nuestra vida.




Saints Peter and Paul

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
