



#### The Real Presence of Christ

By the power of the Holy Spirit, Christ is present in the proclamation of God's Word, in the Eucharistic assembly, in the person of the priest, but above all and in a wholly unique manner in the Eucharist. This presence is called 'real'-by which is not intended to exclude the other types of presence as if they could not be 'real' too, but because it is presence in the fullest sense: that is to say, it is a substantial presence by which Christ, God and man, makes himself wholly

and entirely present" (CCC, no. 1374, citing Pope Paul VI, Mystery of Faith, no. 39).

Since the Middle Ages, the change of bread and wine into the Body and Blood of Christ has been called "transubstantiation." This means that the substance of the bread and wine is changed into the substance of the Body and Blood of Christ. The appearances of bread and wine remain (color, shape, weight, chemical composition), but the underlying reality—that is, the substance—is now the Body and Blood of Christ.

The Real Presence of Jesus Christ endures in the consecrated elements even after the Mass is ended. Once Communion has been distributed, any remaining hosts are placed in the tabernacle. If any of the Precious Blood remains, it is reverently consumed. The hosts are reserved to provide Communion for the sick, Viaticum (Communion

for the dying), and to allow the faithful to worship Christ in the reserved Sacrament and to pray in his presence. As a sign of adoration, Latin Catholics genuflect to the Real Presence of Jesus Christ in the tabernacle or genuflect or kneel when the Blessed Sacrament is exposed for prayer. Eastern Catholics show their reverence by a profound bow rather than a genuflection: "It is for this reason the tabernacle should be located in an especially worthy place in the Church and should

be constructed in such a way that it emphasizes and manifests the truth of the real presence of Christ in the Blessed Sacrament" (CCC, no. 1379).

With the passage of time, reverent reflection led the Church to enrich its Eucharistic devotion. Faith that Jesus is truly present in the Sacrament led believers to worship Christ dwelling with us permanently in the Sacrament. Wherever the Sacrament is, there is Christ, who is our Lord and our God. Such worship is expressed in many ways: in genuflection, in adoration of the Eucharist, and in the many forms of Eucharistic devotion that faith has nourished.

The Eucharistic Liturgy contains the entire treasure of the Church since it makes present the Paschal Mystery, the central event of salvation. Eucharistic adoration and devotion flow from and lead to the Eucharistic Liturgy, the Mass.

#### ETERNAL LIFE

What happens after we die? Most religions and philosophies provide some notion of this, but we are confounded by the mystery of it all. Today's readings give us a glimpse through the faith of martyrs and in the words of Jesus. In the Old Testament reading, the Maccabee brothers assert with total confidence that the God who gave them life would also raise them to eternal life. This was not universally accepted in ancient Israel. The Sadducees, who denied any resurrection of the dead, try to trap Jesus with a hypothetical riddle. Jesus, known for turning such things around, dismisses their unbelief, noting that even Moses knew that all are alive in God. Saint Paul tells the Thessalonians that we live in everlasting encouragement and hope, and Psalm 17 echoes this with words of faith that we will see God's face, waking in God's loving presence. 

#### BE STRONG IN FAITH

Today's readings present us with extreme examples of faithfulness and reliance on the promise of eternal life. Most of us will never be tortured because of our Christian faith, although people are martyred every year because of their commitment to Christ. While we may never face bodily harm as Christians, there are consequences to living as a disciple. We might be ridiculed or harassed. We might find it necessary to call out injustice in the workplace or our local city, and such witness may cost us our jobs and friendships. What are we prepared to do as followers of our Lord? Today, we are encouraged to be strong in faith, secure in the belief that when we endure in Christ, we may look forward to life in eternity with God.

#### THE APPLE OF GOD'S EYE

Any who have a relationship with a child—parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles, special friends—know the power of love it is possible to feel for another. It is not that the child is incapable of doing wrong; we know they can and will. Rather, their mistakes do not change our love for them. In fact, the love makes us want what is best for them. Often, we can see their potential with greater perspective than they themselves can. They're the apple of our eye. We are the apple of God's eye, beloved children of our Lord. God knows (God really knows) that we can and will fail. We fall short of the potential that God is certain we have. Yet God does not cease to love us and to call us to live as God's own in the world.

#### HIDDEN IN THE SHADOW OF GOD'S WINGS

Certain that we are held closely by God frees us to live the challenge of the gospel, to give our lives for the sake of others. We will be tempted to take the easy route and ignore the voice of the Lord, listening instead to the call of wealth, power, acceptance, status, and earthly security. Today's readings remind us that we can face temptation, secure that we are hidden in the shadow of God's wings, strengthened and guarded from evil by our Lord Jesus Christ. What challenging thing are you called to do today as a follower

of Jesus? About what must you take a stand? What might be the consequences of discipleship at this time in your life? "May the Lord direct your hearts to the love of God and the endurance of Christ."

#### SER FUERTES EN LA FE

Las lecturas de hoy nos presentan ejemplos extremos de fidelidad y confianza en la promesa de la vida eterna. La mayoría de nosotros nunca seremos torturados a causa de nuestra fe cristiana, aunque cada año hay personas que son martirizadas por su compromiso con Cristo. Aunque nunca nos enfrentemos a un daño físico como cristianos, vivir como discípulos tiene sus consecuencias. Podemos ser ridiculizados o acosados. Es posible que tengamos que denunciar las injusticias en el lugar de trabajo o en nuestra ciudad, y que ese testimonio nos cueste nuestro trabajo y nuestras amistades. ¿Qué estamos dispuestos a hacer como seguidores de nuestro Señor? Hoy se nos anima a ser fuertes en la fe, con la seguridad de que, cuando resistimos en Cristo, podemos esperar la vida en la eternidad con Dios.

#### LA NIÑA DE LOS OJOS DE DIOS

No es que el niño sea incapaz de hacer el mal; sabemos que puede hacerlo y lo hará. Más bien, sus errores no cambian nuestro amor por ellos. De hecho, el amor nos hace desear lo mejor para ellos. A menudo, podemos ver su potencial con mayor perspectiva que ellos mismos. Son la niña de nuestros ojos. Somos la niña de los ojos de Dios, hijos amados de nuestro Señor. Dios sabe (Dios realmente sabe) que podemos y vamos a fallar. No alcanzamos el potencial que Dios está seguro de que tenemos. Sin embargo, Dios no deja de amarnos y de llamarnos a vivir como propios en el mundo.

#### ESCONDIDOS A LA SOMBRA DE LAS ALAS DE DIOS

La certeza de que somos sostenidos de cerca por Dios nos libera para vivir el desafío del Evangelio, para dar nuestra vida por el bien de los demás. fiante estás llamado a hacer hoy como seguidor de Jesús? ¿Sobre qué debes tomar posición? ¿Cuáles podrían ser las consecuencias del discipulado en este momento de tu vida? "Que el Señor dirija sus corazones al amor de Dios y a la firmeza de Cristo".

#### Blessed Duns Scotus

A Franciscan priest and theologian, Bl. Duns Scotus debated against the Dominicans in the thirteenth century, defending Mary's Immaculate Conception.
