



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Gospel Meditation Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

In the year 1995, in the seventeenth year of my life, when Fife Symington was governor of Arizona, Bill Clinton was president of the United States, Chuck Keiffer was pastor of St. Theresa parish in Phoenix, Arizona, and Ron and Mary were my parents, the word of God came to my youth minister Eric and through him I started to see the salvation of God. Soon, Christ came into my life never to leave. I'm thankful beyond words.

Why am I being so specific, you ask? Because in the Gospel this week we hear the specific names of people holding civic and religious authority in first century Palestine when "the word of God came to John the Baptist:" Tiberius Caesar, Pontius Pilate, Herod, Philip, Lysanias, Annas, Caiaphas, and Zechariah. All this is meant to help us see that God breaks into our history, into real human events. Jesus is no mere myth. He is the Word-which-breaks-in, in concrete moments, you might say. And now we anticipate his coming once again in our specific situations.

Advent challenge: Name as many civic and religious leaders who are in authority currently in your life. Now, name who the potential John the Baptists may be. A spouse? A friend? A podcaster? A work colleague who brings God's word to you? Spend a moment considering that this comprises the concrete, historical setting into which Christ wishes to come. Then, with these specifics in mind, pray: "Come, Lord Jesus. Come."



The Straight Path

Ten to fifteen years ago the Department of Transportation decided that it would be fun to give everyone in my zip code something to complain about and replaced most of our major intersections with roundabouts.

This wouldn't be so irksome, I suppose, if I understood how to navigate a roundabout. In theory I do, I've read all the rules and I've watched those cute little YouTube videos where they show you which car is supposed to go at what time. But theory and practice are rather different. And the bottom line is, I never approach a roundabout without taking a deep, anxious breath and tightening my grip on the steering wheel, not entirely sure what my next move should be.

I think of roundabouts every time I hear today's Gospel reading, where John the Baptist echoes Isaiah in beseeching us to make straight the paths of the Lord. See, I always think I've made a straight path between me and God. I go to Mass. I go to Confession. I say my prayers.

He can get to me if He wants, I tell myself.

But without realizing it, I put up roundabouts. I make rules. You go here, God, and then I go here. I'll do this, God, but first You do this. You stay in your lane, and I stay in mine. Eventually I find myself taking a different route altogether; the road that stretches between me and Him is too daunting. I start avoiding it.

Sometimes I think God wants the path to be straight not for Himself but for us. He can handle a roundabout. But He knows that when we must run to Him, we have to do it without thinking. In the dark. In fear, in anxiety.

So, this Advent, beware the roundabouts. Make straight the path.

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

What is the Hispanic Advent custom of "Las Posadas"?

Answer:

"Posada" is the Spanish word for inn or lodging. "Las Posadas" refers to a traditional Advent custom in preparation for the birth of Jesus, beginning on December 16. For nine successive evenings, groups reenact the search of Mary and Joseph for shelter in Bethlehem.

Two children dress as Mary and Joseph, sometimes with Mary riding on an actual donkey. They are usually accompanied by children dressed as angels and shepherds along with the Wise Men. Adults accompany them as they process to designated homes where they sing Christmas songs and request lodging. Part of the group enters the home and becomes the chorus that responds to the request for lodging. In the beginning the request is rebuffed. They move to several more homes where the ritual is repeated. Eventually, at the last home, their need is recognized, and they all enter the home where a party ensues. This is repeated in different neighborhoods and homes each of the nine days.

While this custom teaches children an important aspect of the Christmas story, it also emphasizes the need for hospitality to strangers and the continual need we all have to make room for Jesus in our "posada." As we struggle to arrive at a fair and just immigration policy, it would be good to recall the fact that Mary, Joseph, and Jesus were also immigrants looking for a hospitable place to dwell.



DIOCESE OF LITTLE ROCK

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November 24, 2024 Feast of Christ the King

My brothers and sisters in Christ,

The feast of the Immaculate Conception is the patronal feast of the United States and is a Holy Day of Obligation. For a period of time, when this feast fell on a Monday or a Saturday, as it does this year, it was not obligatory. However, the Vatican recently clarified that even when a Holy Day of Obligation is transferred to a Saturday or Monday, there remains the obligation to attend Mass on that day. Elsewhere in the United States a few bishops have made an exception for their diocese, lifting the obligation. We have not done that here. In Arkansas the obligation remains. As with any Holy Day of Obligation, individual priests can exempt individual persons from the obligation for a just reason, but there will be no blanket exemption of the diocese or individual parishes here. One reason is that this feast is the patronal feast of the United States, and our painfully divided country is in need of more prayer and more help from the Blessed Mother's intercession than ever before.

One such area where help from heaven is needed is in the area of immigration, about which there is much division and heated rhetoric about massive deportations. This is not just a political matter as some would have it, but also a moral matter, a human rights matter about which our Catholic faith has much to say. Back in 2008 I issued a pastoral letter on the human rights of immigrants, in which I address what our faith has to say 1) about immigration as a basic human right, 2) about the reason for national borders, 3) about the rule of law and its limits, and 4) about the need for comprehensive immigration reform. An electronic version of this pastoral letter can be downloaded from our diocesan website-dolr.org. The original print version is available by simply contacting the diocese.

This is not the only matter about which we need to pray for the intercession of the Blessed Mother on this our patronal feast of the Immaculate Conception, but it is a big issue about which our faith has something to say. It is my hope that by entrusting to the Blessed Mother this and other matters we face as a nation, we will heal divisions and find solutions truly worthy of the Lord.

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24 de noviembre de 2024 Fiesta de Cristo Rey

Mis hermanos y hermanas en Cristo,

La fiesta de la Inmaculada Concepción es la fiesta patronal de los Estados Unidos y es un día santo de precepto. Durante un tiempo, cuando esta fiesta caía en lunes o sábado, como es el caso de este año, la asistencia no era obligatoria. Sin embargo, el Vaticano aclaró recientemente que incluso cuando un día santo de precepto se traslada a sábado o lunes, sigue existiendo la obligación de asistir a misa ese día. En otras partes de los Estados Unidos, algunos obispos han hecho una excepción para su diócesis, eliminando la obligación. No hemos hecho eso aquí. En Arkansas, la obligación sigue vigente. Como ocurre con cualquier día santo de precepto, los sacerdotes individuales pueden eximir a personas individuales de la obligación por una razón justa, pero aquí no habrá una exención general para la diócesis o las parroquias individuales. Una de las razones es que esta fiesta es la fiesta patronal de los Estados Unidos, y nuestro país dolorosamente dividido necesita más oración y más ayuda de la intercesión de la Santísima Madre que nunca antes.

Uno de esos ámbitos en los que se necesita la ayuda del cielo es el de la inmigración. Hay mucha división y una retórica acalorada amenazando deportaciones masivas. No se trata sólo de un asunto político, como algunos quieren decir, sino también de un asunto moral, un asunto de derechos humanos sobre el que nuestra fe católica tiene mucho que decir. En 2008 publiqué una carta pastoral sobre los derechos humanos de los inmigrantes, en la que abordo lo que nuestra fe tiene que decir 1) sobre la inmigración como un derecho humano básico, 2) sobre la razón de tener fronteras nacionales, 3) sobre el estado de derecho y sus límites, y 4) sobre la necesidad de una reforma migratoria integral. Se puede descargar una versión electrónica de esta carta pastoral en español o inglés desde nuestro sitio web diocesano: dolr.org. La versión impresa original está disponible simplemente poniéndose en contacto con la diócesis.

Este no es el único asunto por el que debemos orar pidiendo la intercesión de la Santísima Madre en esta nuestra fiesta patronal de la Inmaculada Concepción, pero es un gran asunto sobre el cual nuestra fe tiene algo que decir. Tengo la esperanza de que al confiarle a la Santísima Madre este y otros asuntos que enfrentamos como nación, podamos sanar las divisiones y encontrar soluciones verdaderamente dignas del Señor.
