





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Gospel Meditation Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

St. Thomas Aquinas said that friends share three things: time, possessions and secrets. For example, how do I know if you're my friend? Well, let's say we've been to Mexico together, you've tried my shaky attempts at pasta carbonara, and you know what ridiculous costume I wore in a music video I filmed in my early twenties. We, dear reader, are definitely friends. We've shared time, possessions and secrets.

How does friendship with Jesus develop? The same way. Jesus lives and eats with his disciples. Then he takes Peter, James and John to Mount Tabor and there reveals to them his deepest secret: his glorious, divine Sonship. The majesty of God shines from within his humanity in a way that goes beyond description. God the Father confirms this "secret," saying, "This is my chosen Son, listen to him" (Luke 9:35). It's all so precious that "they fell silent and did not at that time tell anyone." Do we take time to be alone with Christ, to allow him to mystically share this "secret" with us as his dear friends?

Lenten challenge: This week, identify one time when you experienced an awareness of some specific aspect of Jesus — perhaps on a retreat, at Mass, in prayer or in an act of service. Spend ten minutes consciously re-living that experience in your heart. If you can't recall one, set aside at least two hours this Lent as a mini retreat, either alone in nature or in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament. Focus on him and ask him to share the secrets of his heart with you. He will. Then, as his friend, share the secrets in your heart.



Mini Reflection: It's always helpful to get the opinion of someone we trust when we're facing a situation that confuses or alarms us. But we all have a divine confidante that can help us sort through anything we're dealing with. Are we taking advantage of that?

The Divine Confidante

My husband pretty much knows that if he tells me something — anything — he's also telling my sister.

Most of us have that person that we run to when we have important information. I'm not even talking about gossip; I'm talking about stuff we just *have* to discuss. We joke that I don't really know how I feel about something until I've run it by my sister first.

There's not really anything wrong with that. When we're trying to figure out how to think about something that has happened or how to react to a certain situation, it's always helpful to get the opinion of someone we trust.

But what if we ran as quickly to discuss the situation with God as we did to discuss it with our "person?" Wouldn't that be ideal?

After witnessing the transfiguration — an event that had to have been as confusing as it was astounding — we hear that the disciples "fell silent and did not at that time tell anyone what they had seen."

When something profound, frightening, or confusing happens, our first confidente should be God. I'm reminded of Luke 2:19: "Mary kept all these things, pondering them in her heart." There is something to be said for taking a moment to keep that information sacred between ourselves and the One who can really help us confront it.

Sure, maybe we don't understand what just happened. Maybe we're scared by it. We don't really know how we feel about it. And that's totally okay. The divine confidente knows how to help us pray through that confusion, that fear.

If you're someone's "person" and they come to you wanting to talk, that's great. Talk it out. But remind them — and remind yourself — to pray about it as much as you talk about it.

Let the love of those things carry you through this Lent, and beyond.

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

Can you recommend some good books for Lenten spiritual reading?

Answer:

On more than one occasion, a coach being interviewed about his team — successful or not — will be asked about the next step. The inevitable response includes something about getting back to basics. Reviewing the fundamentals of the sport strengthens performance and builds confidence.

The best Lenten reading takes us back to the fundamentals. If Lent is the time for the Church to be on retreat, then we should focus on the texts that help us deepen our understanding of our faith. Spend time reading one of the Gospels. and use a Scripture commentary to learn all you can about the passion of Jesus. Read about the lives of the saints, especially your patron saint and that of your parish. Perhaps there is some local candidate for sainthood, like Father Walter Ciszek, SJ, who wrote several faith-inspiring books. Finally, you can use the Catechism of the Catholic Church to learn more about the church's teachings and beliefs. The sections on prayer and the Mass are really great reflections. Focusing on the basics really helps us take another step forward in our faith. We have not only a better understanding of what we believe and practice. but also why we believe. With that belief comes the confidence we need to be better, more faithful witnesses to Christ.

Faith Formation Companion to Prayers in the Pew™

→ MONTHLY SYNOPSIS ←

March 2025 – Lent encompasses virtually the whole month of March this year. It is a penitential season in which we aim to overcome our worldly tendencies and strengthen our spiritual lives. Greater devotion to the sacramentals this month will dispose us to receive the immense graces of our Sunday Mass attendance.

ST. THOMAS AQUINAS' PREPARATION FOR MASS

One of the Catholic Church's many saints of the Eucharist is St. Thomas Aquinas (1225-1274), a Dominican priest who lived in the Middle Ages and is con-

sidered the Church's greatest theologian.

Because of his great devotion to the Blessed Sacrament, Pope Urban IV asked him to compose the prayers and hymns for the Church's newly-established Feast of Corpus Christi, prayers which we still recite in the liturgy more than 750 years later!

St. Thomas believed that no one should come to the Sacrament of Christ's Body and Blood "without reverent devotion and fervent love, without true repentance, or without recalling the mystery of his redemption."

In order to help others prepare themselves to receive the Eucharist worthily, the great saint composed a "Prayer Before Mass," which is one of the finest devotional prayers of the Church.

As you read this prayer, note especially how St. Thomas contrasts the poverty of the human condition with the immense greatness and power of God. Through this Blessed Sacrament, God invites us to become enriched by His very life and holiness!

PRAYER BEFORE MASS

Almighty and ever-living God, I approach the sacrament of Your only-begotten Son Our Lord Jesus Christ, Christ, I come sick to the doctor of life unclean to the fountain of mercy, blind to the radiance of eternal light, and poor and needy to the Lord of Heaven and earth. Lord, in your great generosity, heal my sickness, wash away my defilement, enlighten my blindness, enrich my poverty, and clothe my nakedness.

May I receive the bread of angels, the King of kings and Lord of lords, with humble reverence, with the purity and faith, the repentance and love, and the determined purpose that will help to bring me to salvation. May I receive the sacrament of the Lord's Body and Blood, and its reality and power.

Kind God, may I receive the Body of Your only-begotten Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, born from the womb of the Virgin Mary, and so be received into His mystical body and numbered among His members.

Loving Father, as on my earthly pilgrimage I now receive Your beloved Son under the veil of a sacrament, may I one day see Him face to face in glory, who lives and reigns with You forever. **Amen.**

SPIRITUAL CHALLENGE

In this Lenten Season, let us challenge ourselves to spend an extra five minutes sitting before the Lord before or after Sunday Mass. Let's also take account of the fervor of our devotions so that we can more easily hand on our love for Christ and His Church to others.

FAITH FUNDAMENTALS

Sacraments vs Sacramentals

There is a fundamental distinction between Sacraments and sacramentals. "The sacraments are tangible signs instituted by Christ to give grace." This means that sacraments have grace within them, intrinsically. Sacraments are sacred institutions which require us to be living in union with the Church in order to receive them worthily.

Sacramentals are also tangible signs, but they don't have their holiness in them and do not confer grace the way the sacraments so. They are instituted by the Church, not by Christ directly. Their purpose is to sanctify the circumstances of our lives and to dispose us to receive grace. Using them opens us to God's holiness.

The Catechism (1671-73) identifies three categories of sacramentals: blessings, exorcisms, and devotional items and prayers. Of these, the blessings have greatest priority since they represent the direct intercession of the Church for our lives. (Exorcism is a form of blessing in this sense.) There are also innumerable ritual bless-

ings of people andthings. The Church blesses devotional objects which are very familiar to us: Rosaries, scapulars, medallions, crucifixes, candles, etc.



CATECHISM CONNECTION

1668 – Sacramentals are instituted for the sanctification of certain ministries of the Church, a great variety of circumstances in Christian life, and the use of many things helpful to man.... They always include a prayer, often accompanied by a specific sign, such as the laying on of hands, the sign of the cross, or the sprinkling of holy water (which recalls Baptism).
