First Sunday of Lent

Primer Domingo de Cuaresma



On the First Sunday of Lent, begin your journey with self-reflection and allow yourself to experience the mercy of the Lord. How will you renew your commitment to prayer, fasting and almsgiving this season?

Pope Francis in 2022 is asking for input from Catholic parishes around the world. He is preparing for a large gathering of bishops and other religious leaders in 2023. They will discuss how well the Church is connected to people in the world and how to include the voices of more people, especially those on the margins. The desire is to strengthen the faith of those already connected with the Church and look for ways to bridge gaps with those who have no connection.



Our parish is looking for input from different sources and needs the help of everyone. The traditional approach for such input has been to invite people to gather for a town hall style meeting and ask for comments from those who come. But this approach often fails to hear the perspective of those not comfortable coming to such a meeting. For those who have been hurt or disconnected in any way we need a different approach. It seems that a more individualized conversation is necessary to hear the full variety of thoughts and experiences. For this reason, we are asking that individual members of our parish reach out to those you know and have a conversation about faith. Honesty is necessary, but hard for those who have suffered for any reason. This effort is meant to humbly consider all perspectives and explore the individual journeys of faith that make up our community.

In consultation with the desire of Pope Francis to reach all parts of the world, we propose the following questions:

- 1. Describe a time you have felt connected to God and to the Church.
- 2. Have you ever felt hurt or rejected by God or the Church?
- 3. What could the Church do to help you heal or reconnect?
- 4. What else is important for Church leaders to hear?

Please respond to these questions yourself and think of someone else who might hesitate to answer. The more experiences that are shared the better understanding we can have. **Responses are needed by Sunday, March 13.** Names are optional, but welcome if someone would like contact from the parish. This will take time, but hearing stories is the first step.

In prayer we ask the Holy Spirit to guide these conversations. We understand that many people have experiences with no easy solution, but we trust God to guide us.

Synod Response Forms are available in the vestibule of the church. Please return to the parish office or place in the basket in the vestibule.

El Papa Francisco en 2022 está pidiendo aportes de las parroquias católicas de todo el mundo. Él está preparando para una gran reunión delos obispos y otros líderes religiosos en 2023. Discutirán qué tan bien la Iglesia está conectada con las personas en el mundo y cómo incluir las voces de más personas, especialmente aquellas en los márgenes. El deseo es fortalecer la fe de aquellos que ya están conectados con la Iglesia y buscar formas de cerrar las brechas con aquellos que no están conectados.



Nuestra parroquia está buscando aportes de diferentes fuentes y necesita la ayuda de todos. El enfoque tradicional para tales aportes ha sido invitar a la gente a una reunión y pedir comentarios a los que asisten. Pero este método a menudo no escucha la perspectiva de aquellos que no se sienten cómodos viniendo a tal reunión. Para aquellos que han sido lastimados o desconectados de alguna manera, necesitamos un enfoque diferente. Parece que se necesita una conversación más individualizada para escuchar toda la variedad de pensamientos y experiencias. Por esta razón, pedimos que los miembros individuales de nuestra parroquia se comuniquen con sus conocidos y tengan una conversación sobre la fe. La honestidad es necesaria, pero difícil para quien ha sufrido por cualquier motivo. Este esfuerzo está destinado a considerar humildemente todas las perspectivas y explorar los caminos individuales de fe que conforman nuestra comunidad.

En consulta con el deseo del Papa Francisco de llegar a todas las partes del mundo, proponemos las siguientes preguntas:

- 1. Describa un momento en el que se haya sentido conectado con Dios y con la Iglesia.
- 2. ¿Alguna vez te has sentido herido o rechazado por Dios o la Iglesia?
- 3. ¿Qué podría hacer la Iglesia para ayudarlo a sanar o reconectarse?
- 4. ¿Qué más es importante que escuchen los líderes de la Iglesia?

Por favor responde a estas preguntas usted mismo y piense en otra persona que podría dudar en responder. Cuantas más experiencias se compartan, mejor comprensión podremos tener. **Se necesitan respuestas antes del domingo 13 de marzo**. Los nombres son opcionales, pero bienvenidos si alguien desea comunicarse con la parroquia. Esto llevará tiempo, pero escuchar historias es el primer paso.

En oración le pedimos al Espíritu Santo que guíe estas conversaciones. Entendemos que muchas personas tienen experiencias que no tienen fácil solución, pero confiamos en que Dios nos guíe.



JOURNEY TO THE FOOT OF THE CROSS: BISHOP RICKEN OFFERS 10 THINGS TO REMEMBER FOR LENT

Bishop David L. Ricken of Green Bay, Wisconsin, former chairman of the Committee on Evangelization and Catechesis of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB), offers "10 Things to Remember for Lent":

- 1. Remember the formula. The Church does a good job capturing certain truths with easy-to-remember lists and formulas: 10 Commandments, 7 sacraments, 3 persons in the Trinity. For Lent, the Church gives us almost a slogan—Prayer, Fasting, and Almsgiving—as the three things we need to work on during the season.
- 2. It's a time of prayer. Lent is essentially an act of prayer spread out over 40 days. As we pray, we go on a journey, one that hopefully brings us closer to Christ and leaves us changed by the encounter with him.
- 3. It's a time to fast. With the fasts of Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, meatless Fridays, and our personal disciplines interspersed, Lent is the only time many Catholics these days actually fast. And maybe that's why it gets all the attention. "What are you giving up for Lent? Hot dogs? Beer? Jelly beans?" It's almost a game for some of us, but fasting is actually a form of penance, which helps us turn away from sin and toward Christ.
- 4. It's a time to work on discipline. The 40 days of Lent are also a good, set time to work on personal discipline in general. Instead of giving something up, it can be doing something positive. "I'm going to exercise more. I'm going to pray more. I'm going to be nicer to my family, friends, and coworkers."
- 5. It's about dying to yourself. The more serious side of Lenten discipline is that it's about more than self-control—it's about finding aspects of yourself that are less than Christ-like and letting them die. The suffering and death of Christ are foremost on our minds during Lent, and we join in these mysteries by suffering, dying with Christ and being resurrected in a purified form.
- **6.Don't do too much.** It's tempting to make Lent some ambitious period of personal reinvention, but

- it's best to keep it simple and focused. There's a reason the Church works on these mysteries year after year. We spend our entire lives growing closer to God. Don't try to cram it all in one Lent. That's a recipe for failure.
- 7. Lent reminds us of our weakness. Of course, even when we set simple goals for ourselves during Lent, we still have trouble keeping them. When we fast, we realize we're all just one meal away from hunger. In both cases, Lent shows us our weakness. This can be painful, but recognizing how helpless we are makes us seek God's help with renewed urgency and sincerity.
- 8. Be patient with yourself. When we're confronted with our own weakness during Lent, the temptation is to get angry and frustrated. "What a bad person I am!" But that's the wrong lesson. God is calling us to be patient and to see ourselves as he does, with unconditional love.
- 9. Reach out in charity. As we experience weakness and suffering during Lent, we should be renewed in our compassion for those who are hungry, suffering, or otherwise in need. The third part of the Lenten formula is almsgiving. It's about more than throwing a few extra dollars in the collection plate; it's about reaching out to others and helping them without question as a way of sharing the experience of God's unconditional love.
- 10. Learn to love like Christ. Giving of ourselves in the midst of our suffering and self-denial brings us closer to loving like Christ, who suffered and poured himself out unconditionally on the Cross for all of us. Lent is a journey through the desert to the foot of the Cross on Good Friday, as we seek him out, ask his help, join in his suffering, and learn to love like him.

1495-1550 Feast Day—March 8

It is unclear whether he was taken from his Portuguese parents or left freely, but at just eight years old, John lived apart from his parents. He then led an irregular life in Spain and worked at various times as a shepherd, an estate manager, a book seller, and a soldier. His conversion at age 40 took such extreme forms—including beating himself in public while confessing his sins—that he was temporarily confined for lunacy. While confined, he began to serve other patients. In 1538, he began hospital work caring for the impoverished sick, begging for the supplies needed. He devoted himself to sheltering and caring for the needy, including prostitutes and vagabonds. While he experienced persecution at first, this work eventually brought him respect and renown.

He died on his 55th birthday, after which his companions who had joined him in service were organized into the Hospitaller Order of the Brothers of St. John of God. John of God is the patron of booksellers, firefighters, hospitals, nurses, and the sick.

1495-1550

Fiesta-8 de marzo

No está claro si lo separaron de sus padres portugueses o si lo dejaron en libertad, pero con solo ocho años, John vivía separado de sus padres. Luego llevó una vida irregular en España y trabajó en varios momentos como pastor, administrador de fincas, librero y soldado. Su conversión a los 40 años tomó formas tan extremas, incluyendo golpearse a sí mismo en público mientras confesaba sus pecados, que fue confinado temporalmente por locura. Mientras estaba confinado, comenzó a atender a otros pacientes. En 1538, comenzó la labor hospitalaria atendiendo a los enfermos empobrecidos, mendigando los suministros necesarios. Se dedicó a albergar y cuidar a los necesitados, incluidas las prostitutas y los vagabundos. Si bien experimentó persecución al principio, este trabajo finalmente le trajo respeto y renombre.

Murió en su 55 cumpleaños, después de lo cual sus compañeros que se habían unido a él en el servicio se organizaron en la Orden Hospitalaria de los Hermanos de San Juan de Dios. Juan de Dios es el patrón de los libreros, los bomberos, los hospitales, las enfermeras y los enfermos.


