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Gospel Meditation Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

It was a Delta flight from Salt Lake City to Phoenix, and it looked like an on-time departure. As the large plane rolled away from the gate, the pilot announced over the intercom: "Ladies and Gentlemen, the crew outside didn't fill up the tanks with fuel. We are going back to the gate to wait for them." The passengers groaned with impatience. But over the next hour, we knew the waiting had a purpose: it meant fuel to get us to our destination.

The disciples at the Lord's Ascension are in a similar predicament but on a massively higher plane. They want the Kingdom of God to begin on earth as it is in heaven. But Jesus says, **"I am sending the promise of my Father upon you; but stay in the city until you are clothed with power from on high" (Luke 24:49)**. They stay together in prayer in Jerusalem and wait nine long days until the Holy Spirit descends. Empowered by supernatural gifts, they go forth to the ends of the earth and to their deaths proclaiming the Good News of Jesus. The wait was worth it.

Before you begin a task or endeavor, do you take time to patiently pray for the Holy Spirit to come? The bigger the task, the more ardent the prayer should be. Try it this week, and you'll be clothed with power to get where God wants you to go.



Mini Reflection: The Ascension begins a period of waiting for the disciples. In a sense, we are all waiting, every moment of our lives — lingering in expectation of a promise not yet fulfilled, bound by instructions we only partially comprehend.

Now We Wait

You can tell a lot about a person by how they wait in line.

The driver who leans on her horn if the car in front of her pauses before turning on a red light is probably also the woman who says, "I thought you forgot about us" to the waitress who's slow to bring water to the table.

The shopper with a full cart who lets someone buying two bananas cut ahead of him in the checkout line is probably also the guy who says, "Here, take mine," if the creamer runs out in the morning coffee queue.

Here's how I wait: I pull out my phone. I check my email. I make shopping lists in my head. I busy myself. The anxiety of falling behind is just too overwhelming. Waiting scares me.

I'm not saying the first person is nasty and bad, the second one is a saint, and I'm a neurotic workaholic. I'm only saying that it's hard to press "pause" on the fulfillment of any desire we have, even if it's just the desire to move on. It's hard to be made to wait. It's a test, and like all tests, it either proves our strengths or reveals our weaknesses.

The Ascension begins a period of waiting for the disciples. Christ has been with them, blessed them, taught them — and now he's gone in a cloud, leaving behind a vague promise that they can't really understand.

Make no mistake: this is a test. And it reveals them to be faithful. They return to Jerusalem "with great joy" (Luke 24:52) and receive, a few days later, the Holy Spirit.

In a sense, we are all waiting, every moment of our lives lingering in expectation of a promise not yet fulfilled, bound by instructions we only partially comprehend.

This is a test. What will it reveal about us?

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

Why do some people receive Communion in the hand, while others have it put on the tongue? And is one better than the other?

Answer:

Prior to the liturgical reforms that accompanied the Second Vatican Council, it was the universal practice that Catholics would receive communion "on the tongue," meaning that the one receiving would allow the priest distributing communion to place the consecrated host on their outstretched tongue. At this time, only the priest celebrant (and, on special occasions, priests assisting at the Mass) was allowed to receive the Precious Blood.

Since 1977 (with the approval of the Holy See) the bishops of the United States have officially approved two equally valid options for receiving Holy Communion in Masses celebrated according to the Ordinary Form of the Mass. As the bishops' statement Norms for Holy Communion Under Both Kinds states:

The communicant may choose whether to receive the Body of Christ in the hand or on the tongue. When receiving in the hand, the communicant should be guided by the words of St. Cyril of Jerusalem: "When you approach, take care not to do so with your hand stretched out and your fingers open or apart, but rather place your left hand as a throne beneath your right, as befits one who is about to receive the King. Then receive him, taking care that nothing is lost" (no. 41).

As we noted, both ways of receiving communion are equally valid in the United States and it is important that we always keep the instructions of the bishops in mind as we reflect on which method we might prefer.





→ MONTHLY SYNOPSIS <</p>

June 2025 – If you glance at the calendar on the second page of this newsletter you will see that June is literally packed with wonderful feast days this year! The celebrations this month highlight the richness of our Catholic Faith and the way in which the Church continues to focus us on the unfathomable mystery of Christ.

THE DIVINE PRAISES

Blasphemy is prohibited by the Second Commandment: "You shall not take the name of the Lord your God in vain". In response to the increase in blasphemy at end of the 1700s, an Italian Jesuit named Luigi Felici wrote the litany we now know as "The Divine Praises."

His original version consisted only of eight short phrases in praise of the Holy Trinity and the saints and angels, but subsequent popes added phrases to fill out the list. Now, fourteen praises comprise this magnificent devotional prayer of the Church. The number fourteen has a biblical character to it – twice the perfect number seven. The Divine Praises have become a standard element of the Eucharistic Adoration and Benediction service.

The Church always counters the devil's blasphemies with blessings, which is why each of the divine praises begins with the words, "Blessed be...." Here are the fourteen Divine Praises that we may pray at any time: *↗*

BIBLE BASICS -

Luke 22:19 Then he took the bread, said the blessing, broke it, and gave it to them, saying, "This is my body, which will be given for you; do this in memory of me."

Romans 8:11 If the Spirit of the one who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, the one who raised Christ from the dead will give life to your mortal bodies also, through his Spirit that dwells in you. Blessed be God. Blessed be his Holy Name. Blessed be Jesus Christ, true God and true man. Blessed be the name of Jesus. Blessed be his Most Sacred Heart. Blessed be his Most Precious Blood. Blessed be Jesus in the Most Holy Sacrament of the altar. Blessed be the Holy Spirit, the Paraclete. Blessed be the Holy Spirit, the Paraclete. Blessed be the great Mother of God, Mary Most Holy. Blessed be her holy and Immaculate Conception. Blessed be her glorious Assumption. Blessed be the name of Mary, Virgin and Mother. Blessed be St Joseph, her most chaste spouse. Blessed be God in his Angels and in his Saints. **Amen.**

FAITH FUNDAMENTALS



Rules for the Eucharistic Fast

The Church's rules for worthy reception of the Eucharist are commonly known as the

"Eucharistic fast". There are two primary rules, which come directly from canon law:

- 1. One who is to receive the Most Holy Eucharist is to abstain from any food or drink, with the exception of water and medicine, for at least the period of one hour before Holy Communion. (Canon 919.1)
- 2. A person who is conscious of grave sin is not to celebrate Mass or receive the body of the Lord without previous sacramental confession unless there is a grave reason and there is no opportunity to confess; in this case the person is [obliged to]... make an act of perfect contrition which includes the resolution of confessing as soon as possible. (Canon 916)

Other rules related to receiving Holy Communion apply in unusual circumstances in order to protect the Eucharist from abuse or help to accommodate unavoidable human situations:

- A person who has already received the Eucharist may receive a second time on the same day, but it must be within a Mass (Canon 917);
- Anyone excommunicated must not receive Communion until the penalty is lifted and until there is a definite reform of life (Canon 915);
- The elderly, the sick, and those who care for them may receive Communion if they have eaten something within the preceding hour (Canon 919.3). In such a case, the fasting obligation is reduced to one guarter of an hour (Immensae Caritatis, 1973).
