

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Gospel Meditation Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

Sin isn't given its due these days. Downplaying sin is dangerous. But there is also another spiritual misstep in which we make way too big a deal out of sin. It happens, for example, when we persistently wonder if our confessed sins are "really" forgiven, or suspiciously ponder what God "really" thinks about us, behind His merciful face. Or when someone returns to Church, and we question whether his or her conversion was genuine. Or when we commit some sin and put on a sad face for days, thinking, "Maybe my sins are too great for God to deal with." God save us from that attitude!

Well, he does just that, this week, in the raising of Jairus' daughter. The dead twelve-year-old's house is filled with a spirit of excessive moaning and groaning, tumultuous weeping and wailing. They even laugh at Jesus in a mocking tone. It's shocking how *easy* it is for him to raise the dead child. It is equivalent to gently waking a kid from a light nap. And then he sends her off to get some lunch. No big whoop. The overactive drama is actually part of the problem, and removing it is a key part of the miracle.

Friends, sin can and does kill, but Jesus is *always* ready and able to raise us back to life, often without much hullabaloo. His ease of forgiving should never be a pretext for presumption, minimizing sin, or taking lightly the cost he pays for our sins on the cross. But for God's sake, we often need Jesus to put out the weepers and wailers. He's the Lord. And remember, the girl is not dead, she's just sleeping.



The Touch of Christ

For a long time, I didn't understand why the virtual Masses of the pandemic were so wearisome to me. Theoretically, shouldn't it be a tired mother's dream, fulfilling her Sunday obligation from the couch, not having to worry how much noise the kids are making?

But it wasn't. Seeing Mass without experiencing it left me hungry. It left me starving.

Then a wise priest explained it to me. "Watching virtual Mass is like taking a virtual shower," he said.

Grace might not be something we can see with our eyes, but it is very much something that is transmitted physically. Jesus has a human body for a reason. He needs to touch people.

We see that nowhere more clearly than in this Gospel. The crowds are pressing on him, everyone trying to get close, everyone trying to share his space. The hemorrhaging woman claws her way through, desperate to make physical contact with him, any part of him, even his cloak. The synagogue official begs Jesus to come and "lay hands" on his daughter, knowing that this is the only way for her to survive. He doesn't ask for Jesus' good thoughts or approving gaze. He knows that isn't what he needs.

In the Gospels, Jesus saves people chiefly through his own touch because he wants to show us — you and me, sitting in the pews — something very important about how we are saved.

But where do you and I find the touch of Jesus Christ? Where do you and I find salvation?

It's in the water flowing over the infant's forehead. It's in the Host dissolving on our tongues. It's in the oil that is pressed to the skin of the confirmand, the dying man, and the brand-new priest. It's in the embrace of the newly married couple. It's in the extended hand of the priest as he says, "Your sins are forgiven."

It's still here, two thousand years later. It's still waiting for us to reach out and grasp it.

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

In today's digital world, do we really need to be face-to-face with a priest to confess our sins? Would Facetime or Zoom ever be allowed?

Answer:

The question of whether or not Catholics can celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation virtually (via social media, by phone, or in some other way) is a question that has actually been around for several years. The recent COVID-19 pandemic brought the question back in a new way, especially as many parishes were forced to introduce a sort of "social distanced" confession, with the sacrament being celebrated outdoors.

In reflecting on this question, however, there are a couple points that we want to keep in mind. First, as the Code of Canon Law observes in different places, the faithful have a right to the sacraments of the Church and the Church's ministers have a responsibility to make them accessible. At the same time, however, we always have to be sure that we respect the nature of the sacraments themselves.

Although modern forms of technology and communication can help us in our work of evangelization catechesis, the Pontifical Council for Social Communication has reminded us that, "Virtual reality is no substitute for the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist, the sacramental reality of the other sacraments, and shared worship in a flesh and blood human community. There are no sacraments on the internet" (The Church and the Internet, no. 9).


Although our encounters with others on the internet and via social media can be considered "real" in one sense, in the sacraments we encounter Christ in a personal and ecclesial way. It is never just a private experience but is always grounded in the life of the Church and this means that it must truly be personal, including the contact between the confessor and the penitent. While the convenience or ease of online celebrations might be appealing for many reasons, at heart, we always want to keep in mind the fullness of the Church's tradition and the meaning of the sacraments.



National Eucharistic Revival Supplement – June 2024

We are on the threshold of the National Eucharistic Congress! Like the disciples on the Road to Emmaus, we have learned to discern and long for the Lord's Real Presence in the breaking of bread.



THE HOLY ANGELS ASSIST US IN EUCHARISTIC WORSH

Eucharistic Saint

St. Tarcisius (3rd century AD)—During a violent persecution, a twelve-year-old altar boy named Tarcisius volunteered to secretly carry the Eucharist to imprisoned Christians. On his way to the prison, he was attacked by a mob of boys who killed him but not before he handed the sacred Hosts over to a man who came to his aid. He is the first known martyr of the Eucharist.

Back to Basics

WORSHIP VS. VENERATION: The Catechism tells us that man owes worship to God as a sacred duty (CCC, 2095). In obedience to the First Commandment (Ex 20:5, Lk 4:8) we worship God alone! The Catholic liturgies, especially the Eucharist, are the Church's primary acts of divine worship.



Our relationship with God's holy ones—Our Lady, the saints and angels—is not worship or idolatry. It is veneration: love, esteem, and respect. Veneration increases our friendship with our spiritual companions in heaven and strengthens our own spiritual lives through their intercession.

The holy angels are our greatest allies in worshipping God, especially in the Mass: In her Liturgy, the Church joins with the angels to adore the thrice-holy God ["Holy, Holy, Holy!"] (CCC, 335).

We invoke the angels in the First Eucharistic Prayer, "Almighty God, we pray that your angel may take this sacrifice to your altar in heaven," and in the conclusion of the funeral liturgy: "May the angels lead you into Paradise."

Faith in Action



Assistance – It is a holy thing to ask your guardian angel to help you worship better when you go to Mass. Angels are the custodians of heavenly worship (Rev 8:3-4) so they happily assist us with focus, attention, devotion, prayer, and praise.

Dressing for Mass – When the Book of Hebrews speaks of angels at worship, it describes them as "a myriad of angels in festal garments" (Heb 12:22)—such a beautiful metaphor! If the angels dress so wondrously for heavenly worship, shouldn't we also come to Mass as if it were the greatest event of our week?

"If the angels could be jealous of men, they would be so for one reason: Holy Communion."

→ MONTHLY SYNOPSIS ←

June 2024 – The entire month of June is in Ordinary Time, but it is also filled with great post-Easter feast days like Corpus Christi and the Sacred and Immaculate Hearts. Let us ask the grace this month to immerse ourselves in the Church's rich faith life and adore Christ with our reverent participation at Mass.

THE DIVINE MERCY PRAYER

The humble Polish nun who received the apparitions of Jesus, the Divine Mercy, from 1931-1938 had only three years of formal education. Yet, she was the originator of a worldwide movement of grace.

St. Maria Faustina Kowalska of the Congregation of Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy was chosen by Jesus to spread the message of His Mercy during a century that was known for its utter barbarism: two world wars, the dropping of the Atomic Bomb, and the unleashing of plagues such as abortion, pornography, and euthanasia throughout the entire world.

Jesus asked St. Faustina to write down her experiences (now known as the *Diary*) and to propagate them in the form of the Chaplet of the Divine Mercy, whic begins

begins with the noble and beautiful prayer below. He also commanded her to have an image of Him painted (with red and white light being emitted from His Sacred Heart) so that His Mercy could be venerated by all.

THE DIVINE MERCY PRAYER

You expired, Jesus, but the source of life gushed forth for souls, and the ocean of mercy opened up for the whole world. O Fount of Life, unfathomable Divine Mercy, envelop the whole world and empty Yourself out upon us.

(The participant then repeats the following petition three times)

O Blood and Water, which gushed forth from the Heart of Jesus as a fount of mercy for us, I trust in You!

Although Sr. Faustina established the content of this devotion, it was the bishop of her local diocese, Karol Wojtyla, who is most responsible for its promotion. After he was elected Pope John Paul II in 1978, he authorized the devotion for universal use. He canonized St. Faustina in the year 2000, as the first saint of the new Millennium.

The Four Last Things

The Church always tells us what we need to hear, not always what we want to hear. This is especially true of the doctrine of the Four Last Things: Death, Judgment, Heaven and Hell.

The Church wants us to think about what comes after this earthly life now before we actually come face to face with these realities at the end of our earthly lives.

Death is a certainty for all mortal beings. It is not just a physical reality but also a spiritual passage. It is that moment when our souls separate from our bodies and our spiritual destiny is fixed for all eternity.

Next comes **Judgment**. There is the immediate judgment of our souls, which the Church calls the "particular judgment". This is followed by the "general judgment" at the end of time where Christ will come "to judge the living and the dead" as we profess in the Creed.

At the moment of death, each of us will make one of two choices that will determine our eternal fate: either **Heaven** or **Hell**. Humans are endowed with free will, and our eternal destiny is fixed by our own choice. Where will you choose to spend eternity?

CATECHISM CONNECTION



1023 Those who die in God's grace and friendship and are perfectly purified live forever with Christ. They are like God for ever, for they "see him as he is, face to face".

1033 To die in mortal sin without repenting and accepting God's merciful love means remaining separated from him forever by our own free choice. This state of definitive self-exclusion from communion with God and the blessed is called "hell".

Praying with the National Eucharistic Revival

Preparation for Holy Communion


Can Almsgiving Atone for Sin?
