

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Gospel Meditation Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

Jesus asks us a stunning question this week: **"How can Satan cast out Satan?"** To enter into this question opens up the often-hidden dynamics of what Jesus has done and is constantly doing. If we're honest, our response to some degree is: "How *else* can we cast him out? Satan is *precisely* how we cast out Satan!" But Jesus wants us to see this finally does not work. Here's what I mean.

Satanas names the demonic mechanism by which we render wholeness through accusation. When we face a threat, we seek something to protect us (e.g., more money, social status, security, power, etc.). Rivals inevitably arise for these things and so do tensions. Accusation presents itself. "I'll never be successful unless I get ahead of that guy." "She's already trying to get ahead of me." "That group of immigrants is trying to take our jobs." And so on. The accusation grows into a fear-inducing threat — things will break apart — no, they already are! Hurry! We inflict violence on the victim and — as if by magic — peace ensues. For a time. Soon fresh accusations are required to hold new chaos at bay, until there is no community left at all. This is essentially humankind's sad history in a nutshell.

Jesus' cross and resurrection unmasks this broken system of "casting out Satan by Satan" and ushers in a new one he calls "the Kingdom of God." He reveals that the dynamic of accusation is nothing compared to his power of divine mercy and love. The cross (and not Satan) is the real power to tear down strongholds of sin and cast out Satan. This is why he describes himself as the **"stronger man who ties up the strong man to plunder his house."** This week let's notice the ways we **"cast out Satan by Satan,"** and then refuse to do it anymore. Because in the long run, that divided house cannot stand.





In the Family Way

Look here: there is no one more family-oriented than me. I drive a minivan. I wear mom jeans. I wipe unidentified gunk off of kids' faces without a second thought.

I'm all about family, but I'm not always a fan of what "family" has come to mean in the modern lexicon. Family values. Family-friendly. Family-oriented. It's usually a synonym for "non-offensive." Soft. Moderate. Nice.

It's all fine, I suppose. But is it genuine? Creating a family, bringing that family physically into the world, was the hardest and most painful thing I ever did. The care and keeping of that family — the teamwork with my spouse, the feeding and watering of the children, the teaching of the writing and the reading the and praying — it's very hardcore. It's not all stuffed animals and peekaboo. It's a mental, spiritual, and physical challenge that daily brings me to my knees.

I'm not even talking exclusively about parenting young children. I'm talking about being part of a family in any way — being a son, being a daughter, being a sister and cousin and uncle. Families are complicated and strange and messy. Sometimes boundaries need to be drawn, or they need to be crossed. Sometimes walls need to be put up or torn down. It's never easy. It's never simple.

But I've never known someone who didn't want to be part of a family in some way, whether that's a blood family or one created by circumstance. And there's a reason Christ creates a family ("Whoever does the will of God is my brother and sister and mother") and not a club.

A family is a crucible, yes — but what comes out is so much more beautiful than what went in. For all the effort and even pain that is sometimes involved in a family relationship, there is nothing more defining, more fulfilling.

We are part of Christ's family, and what we can expect from that is certainly not a life of simple, clear-cut, undemanding discipleship. We can expect confusion. We can expect discomfort. But we can expect to be perpetually drawn to the heart of one who loves us without hesitation, without condition.

In the end, we're family.

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

How do I bring God into the work of my daily life?

Answer:

Whatever your daily work, you have an opportunity to encounter God and to follow His commandments in love. In the New Testament, we see that most of the Apostles didn't have a previous religious position. They were fishermen, tax collectors, and political activists. St. Paul was a tentmaker. Among the saints, we have doctors, lawyers, farmers, and stay-at-home moms. No matter your daily tasks, God can be present there!

One way concerns behavior. Start with an examination of conscience. Look at areas where you tend to struggle to imitate Christ at work. Do you gossip? Does brimming frustration become impatience at home? Pick one sin you struggle with, then choose a virtue to strengthen that area. If you tend to speak poorly of your co-workers, resolve to stop and to say one kind thing a day instead.

Another way relates to perspective, particularly your perspective of others. Jesus' incarnation reminds us of the value of every human being. Jesus is God, and each of us is created in God's image. When you encounter another person, you have an opportunity to see God in a new place and a new way - in that person in front of you. Genuinely listen to them and be present to their concerns. Loving your neighbor is loving God! Our relationship with God and the love He inspires in our hearts shouldn't remain only at church on Sunday. We can - and should - let our faith animate our lives!

National Eucharistic Revival Supplement - June 2024

We are on the threshold of the National Eucharistic Congress! Like the disciples on the Road to Emmaus, we have learned to discern and long for the Lord's Real Presence in the breaking of bread.

THE HOLY ANGELS ASSIST US IN EUCHARISTIC WO

Eucharistic Saint

St. Tarcisius (3rd century AD)-During a violent persecution, a twelve-year-old altar boy named Tarcisius volunteered to secretly carry the Eucharist to imprisoned Christians. On his way to the prison, he was attacked by a mob of boys who killed him but not before he handed the sacred Hosts over to a man who came to his aid. He is the first known martyr of the Eucharist.

Back to Basics

WORSHIP VS. VENERATION: The Catechism tells us that man owes worship to God as a sacred duty (CCC, 2095). In obedience to the First Commandment (Ex 20:5, Lk 4:8) we worship God alone! The Catholic liturgies, especially the Eucharist, are the Church's primary acts of divine worship.

Our relationship with God's holy ones—Our Lady, the saints and angels—is not worship or idolatry. It is veneration: love, esteem, and respect. Veneration increases our friendship with our spiritual companions in heaven and strengthens our own spiritual lives through their intercession.

The holy angels are our greatest allies in worshipping God, especially in the Mass: In her Liturgy, the Church joins with the angels to adore the thrice-holy God ["Holy, Holy, Holy!"] (CCC, 335).

We invoke the angels in the First Eucharistic Prayer, "Almighty God, we pray that your angel may take this sacrifice to your altar in heaven," and in the conclusion of the funeral liturgy: "May the angels lead you into Paradise."

Faith in Action

Assistance - It is a holy thing to ask your guardian angel to help you worship better when you go to Mass. Angels are the custodians of heavenly worship (Rev 8:3-4) so they happily assist us with focus, attention, devotion, prayer, and praise.

Dressing for Mass - When the Book of Hebrews speaks of angels at worship, it describes them as "a myriad of angels in festal garments" (Heb 12:22)—such a beautiful metaphor! If the angels dress so wondrously for heavenly worship, shouldn't we also come to Mass as if it were the greatest event of our week?

"If the angels could be jealous of men, they would be so for one reason: Holy Communion." ~ St. Maximillian Kolbe



→ MONTHLY SYNOPSIS <</p>

June 2024 – The entire month of June is in Ordinary Time, but it is also filled with areat post-Easter feast days like Corpus Christi and the Sacred and Immaculate Hearts. Let us ask the arace this month to immerse ourselves in the Church's rich faith life and adore Christ with our reverent participation at Mass.

THE DIVINE MERCY PRAYER

The humble Polish nun who received the apparitions of Jesus, the Divine Mercy, from 1931-1938 had only three years of formal education. Yet, she was the originator of a worldwide movement of grace.

St. Maria Faustina Kowalska of the Congregation of Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy was chosen by Jesus to spread the message of His Mercy during a century that was known for its utter barbarism: two world wars, the dropping of the Atomic Bomb, and the unleashing of plagues such as abortion, pornography, and euthanasia throughout the entire world.

Jesus asked St. Faustina to write down her experiences (now known as the Diary) and to propagate them in the form of the Chaplet of the Divine Mercy, whic begins A

"The Lord said to me, 'The loss of each soul plunges Me into mortal sadness. You always console Me when you pray for sinners. The prayer most pleasing to Me is prayer for the conversion

begins with the noble and beautiful prayer below. He also commanded her to have an image of Him painted (with red and white light being emitted from His Sacred Heart) so that His Mercy could be venerated by all.

THE DIVINE MERCY PRAYER

You expired, Jesus, but the source of life gushed forth for souls, and the ocean of mercy opened up for the whole world. O Fount of Life, unfathomable Divine Mercy, envelop the whole world and empty Yourself out upon us.

> (The participant then repeats the following petition three times)

O Blood and Water, which gushed forth from the Heart of Jesus as a fount of mercy for us, I trust in You!

Although Sr. Faustina established the content of this devotion, it was the bishop of her local diocese, Karol Wojtyla, who is most responsible for its promotion. After he was elected Pope John Paul II in 1978, he authorized the devotion for universal use. He canonized St. Faustina in the year 2000, as the first saint of the new Millennium.

FAITH FUNDAMENTALS



The Four Last Things

The Church always tells us what we need to hear, not always what we want to hear. This is especially true of the doctrine of the Four Last Things: Death, Judgment, Heaven and Hell.

The Church wants us to think about what comes after this earthly life now before we actually come face to face with these realities at the end of our earthly lives.

Death is a certainty for all mortal beings. It is not just a physical reality but also a spiritual passage. It is that moment when our souls separate from our bodies and our spiritual destiny is fixed for all eternity.

Next comes Judgment. There is the immediate judgment of our souls, which the Church calls the "particular judgment". This is followed by the "general judgment" at the end of time where Christ will come "to judge the living and the dead" as we profess in the Creed.

At the moment of death, each of us will make one of two choices that will determine our eternal fate: either Heaven or Hell. Humans are endowed with free will, and our eternal destiny is fixed by our own choice. Where will you choose to spend eternity?

Dear Pastor/Parish Administrator,

Human trafficking and the abuse of children and vulnerable people are two serious violations of human dignity that demand urgent and comprehensive responses from the Church, governments, and human rights organizations. By working to heal the wounds of victims and their family members, bring perpetrators to justice, and implement awareness and prevention programs, the Church is bringing hope and helping to end abuse and trafficking.

In Venezuela's Archdiocese of Caracas, an anti-trafficking project—combining education, communication, training, and cooperation among ecclesiastical leaders, civil authorities, nongovernmental human rights organizations, and others—used grants from the Collection for the Church in Latin America to combat human trafficking in the region. This broad approach addressed the needs of victims and implemented programs to train civic officials, human rights advocates, and professionals in ways to combat trafficking.

In Peru, the Prelature of Chuquibambilla asked the Collection for the Church in Latin America to help it create, fund, and implement a program to prevent abuse of children and vulnerable people through a three-part training for Church leaders, alliance-building initiatives with health-care and law enforcement organizations, and the creation of protocols to address reported incidents of abuse.

Your support for the Collection for the Church in Latin America is vital to these efforts to prevent and end the violation of those most vulnerable among us.

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

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
