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

#### EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP - RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS

What We Carry from Town to Town

In my experience, there are two kinds of people: the folks who kick off their shoes the second they walk through the door, and the ones who don't. People can feel strongly about this on both sides. The main thrust of the Shoes-Off Brigade seems to be this: we track a lot of weird stuff on the soles of our feet. Little reminders of all the places we've been — whether it's a private home or a public bathroom — cling to our shoes long after we leave.

This same theory applies to our spiritual lives. As human beings and as disciples, we visit a lot of figurative towns and pick up a lot of figurative dust. Sinfulness. Shame. Defeat. Anger. Fear. Doubt. No matter how hard we try to keep free of it, these things have a way of attaching themselves to us, sometimes without us even noticing. We need to take a good look at what unhelpful and unconstructive baggage from our past we're tracking into our present and future encounters.

What is the "town" God is asking you to visit today in His name? Is it a tough conversation with a friend, a brief witness to a stranger in the checkout line, a call to be present to someone in your family? Before you go, remember, shake off the dust. Don't let a past disappointment constrain you. Don't allow yesterday's failures or burdens to keep you from the joy of today's witness, whatever form it might take.



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#### **Gospel Meditation**

#### **Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture**

Once I asked a fallen-away Catholic friend of mine what he remembered about the parish priest from his youth. He said, "He was a gentle, nice guy. Kind of vanilla. Kept to himself." It struck me that he, perhaps like many, perceive Catholic priests as the following: lonely, harmless, and self-sufficient. As a challenge both to this perception (accurate or not) and to us priests who perhaps feel a pull in that uninspiring direction, stands the mighty image of what we see in the Gospel this Sunday.

Jesus sent out his apostles, "two-by-two, with power over demons, and without money belts." Two-by-two: they enjoyed deep fellowship and brotherhood. Power over demons: they were anything but harmless. These men wielded enormous power against evil. Without money belts: they were not self-sufficient. They needed others to help them. Not lonely, but in community. Not harmless but armed with massive spiritual energy. Not self-sufficient, but poor and in need of help.

This is a challenge to me, and perhaps to all of us, living in a rich, secularized, and individualized culture. Do I embrace my priestly ministry in deep fellowship with other priests? Do I speak and act boldly to drive out evil where it is found? Do I live poorly and simply, trusting in the help of those around me even for basic needs? The fruitfulness of priestly ministry largely depends on these three traits. Let's pray for all priests — and, by extension, all of us Christians — to live more like Jesus' communal, poor, and powerful apostles.





#### **Shake Off the Dust**

Our kitchen floor is at least 35 years old, and it's the ugliest color to come out of the '80s. But it's a good, durable floor, and my husband, bless his heart, guards it like it was a finely finished hardwood imported from Brazil.

Every time the kids track mud and sand across its vinyl surface, he immediately gets down on his hands and knees and lovingly wipes the mess away. I'm too impatient to do this myself — we have kids, so we're going to have a dirty floor, is my attitude. But this is the hill upon which my husband dies. On hands and knees, scraping dirt off an almost 40-year-old floor, he is the silent, long-suffering sentry, and if it kills him, he will keep these floors pristine. He is Gandalf, and the dirt is the Balrog. You shall not pass.

"Shake the dust off your feet." This is what Christ tells his disciples to do when they — and his word — are rejected. Shake the dust off your feet in testimony against them. Why does he say that? It's not an act of dismissal. It's not a thumbed nose or a stuck-out tongue. No, it's an act of caution: *Don't bring it with you. Leave it there.* 

When we walk through the world, we pick up a lot of dirt. Misguided notions, disordered priorities, habits, and desires that we never noticed until we realized they left a trail. We come into a situation intending to do what is right, but somehow it all goes sideways, and we walk away from it with detritus clinging to us in places we don't notice. They wouldn't listen. They'll see, we think. Oh, they'll see. They'll see how right I was. Pride and vengeance hitch a ride on the soles of our feet, and we track them all through the world.

What to do about this? You can be like me with my ugly old floor. You can shrug your shoulders and say, "It happens, I guess. I'm only human. I meant well."

But here's what would be better: be like my husband. Get down on your knees and get rid of the dirt. Stop the trail in its tracks.

# Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

#### Question:

Our Catholic grade school is doing a penance service this Lent. Do young children really need to go to Confession? How much sin can they really have?

#### **Answer:**

Ask any mom about her children and see how many would say she has a brood of perfect angels! Parents know that kids do things that are wrong ... and they often know they're doing it! Even toddlers have a sense of right and wrong. The Church recognizes that their minds and consciences are not yet fully developed, however, and typically waits until age seven to offer the sacrament of Confession. Around that age and beyond, most young people, when asked, can easily explain why something is wrong.

Confession for children is an excellent way to help them reflect on their actions and accept responsibility for their behavior. It helps them to grow in their understanding of sin and how it affects others. This helps them to form their consciences and make better choices in the future. Most importantly, they learn the value of forgiveness, both given and received. Rather than singling out what's wrong, Confession offers hope and a new start! Children can grow in understanding God's unconditional love and develop a sense of inner dignity that transcends their failings. Not bad for five minutes and an "Our Father" or two!



## National Eucharistic Revival Supplement – July 2024

Like the disciples on the Road to Emmaus, we have journeyed a long way to arrive at the National Eucharistic Congress which takes place this month! Together, we make a deep act of faith in our Eucharistic Lord.



#### THE NECESSITY OF FAITH AND MORAL LIVING

#### **Eucharistic Saint**

St. Thomas Aquinas (1225-1275 AD) is called the Eucharistic Doctor of the Church. His main work, the Summa Theologica contains a sublime summary of the Church's teaching on the Eucharist. In 1264 he was asked by Pope Urban IV to compose the prayers and hymns for the Church's primary Eucharistic feast: Corpus Christi.

#### **Back to Basics**

THE MIRACLE OF TRANSUBSTANTIATION: Transubstantiation is a miracle, pure and simple, and we witness it at every single Mass. It occurs at the consecration when the bread and wine become the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Jesus through the words and actions of the priest.



At that moment, the inner substance of bread and wine becomes Christ Himself, while the external or "accidental" forms remain the same. This is a spiritual change which we cannot see with our eyes, so we must believe it with faith, as Jesus said to Thomas: "Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed" (John 20:29). The Church tells us:

"It has always been the conviction of the Church of God...that by the consecration of the bread and wine there takes place a change of the whole substance of the bread into the substance of the body of Christ our Lord and of the whole substance of the wine into the substance of his blood." (CCC, 1376)

#### Calls to Action

Faith – There is a sad moment in John's Gospel when some of Jesus' disciples abandon Him because they could not accept His claim that He was the "living bread that came down from heaven" (Jn 6:51, 66). We must not walk away from our Lord but rather make a pure act of faith in His words each time we receive the Eucharist.

Worthiness – Even then, *mere belief* is not enough. We must reform our lives, live in full communion with the Catholic Church (CCC, 1395), and be in a state of grace in order to receive the Eucharist worthily. These are the basics of our Eucharistic faith.

July 2024 – July is dedicated to the Precious Blood of Jesus Christ, which is echoed in our Eucharistic themes this month. In the midst of the summer season, let us strive to develop virtue and cultivate a sense of prayer in all we do.


#### TANTUM ERGO

In the year 1264 AD, Pope Urban IV established the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (often referred to simply as *Corpus Christi*) as the preeminent Eucharistic feast of the Church. In fact, it was the first papally-imposed feast to be entered into the liturgical calendar.

In doing so, Urban didn't settle for a second rate theologian to help him. He commissioned the Church's greatest living theologian, St. Thomas Aquinas (1225-1275) to compose the prayers and hymns for the feast. St. Thomas was living near the pope in Orvieto, Italy at that time, and they were both aware of the Eucharistic miracle that had taken place in a nearby city, Bolsena, just the year before (1263).

The Tantum Ergo is actually an excerpt from a longer hymn entitled "Pange Lingua Gloriosi," of which the Tantum Ergo comprises the last two verses. The hymn extols and explains in poetic language the miracle ?

of transubstantiation that takes place at each celebration of the Eucharistic sacrifice.

The "Pange Lingua" is normally sung on Holy Thursday and Corpus Christi during the Eucharistic processions. The *Tantum Ergo* is most familiar to the faithful from its use as the hymn that is sung during Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament at the end of Eucharistic Adoration.

#### TANTUM ERGO

Down in adoration falling, Lo! the Sacred Host we hail, Lo! o'er ancient forms departing Newer rites of grace prevail; Faith for all defects supplying, Where the feeble senses fail.

To the Everlasting Father,
And the Son Who reigns on high
With the Holy Ghost proceeding
Forth from Each eternally,
Be salvation, honor, blessing,
Might, and endless majesty.
Amen.

This prayer is offered by the priest with responses from the people who attend the Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament at the end of Eucharistic Adoration. It comes immediately after the *Tantum Ergo* and before the priest ascends the altar for Benediction:

V. Thou hast given them bread from heaven. R. Having within it all sweetness.

V. Let us pray: O God, who in this wonderful Sacrament left us a memorial of Thy Passion: grant, we implore Thee, that we may so venerate the Sacred Mysteries of Thy Body and Blood, as always to be conscious of the fruit of Thy Redemption. Thou who livest and reignest forever and ever.

#### -FAITH FUNDAMENTALS -

#### **Eucharistic Adoration**

Catholics regard the Eucharist as the very Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Jesus Christ Himself, offered in sacrifice on the altar of the Cross. What an amazing gift of God to the human race! Our teaching about this Blessed Sacrament has never changed and never will change.

- The Sacrament of the Eucharist was instituted by Christ as a perpetual memorial of His Passion and Death. We "do this in remembrance" of Him (Luke 22:19).
- The Eucharist is not a symbol but is the actual Body and Blood of Christ offered in an unbloody (that is, sacramental) manner on the altar each day.
- Not only do we participate in the celebration of the Eucharist, but most importantly, we worship the Eucharist as divine and holy.

This last point explains the reason why we maintain tabernacles in our churches and why we are able to worship the Eucharist outside of Mass. It is Christ we worship, not just when He is present at Mass but also wherever the sacred Host is reserved or displayed for public worship. Many parishes even have adoration chapels so that the faithful may pray in silence before the Eucharist and continue the angelic work of adoring the Lord in His Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity.






