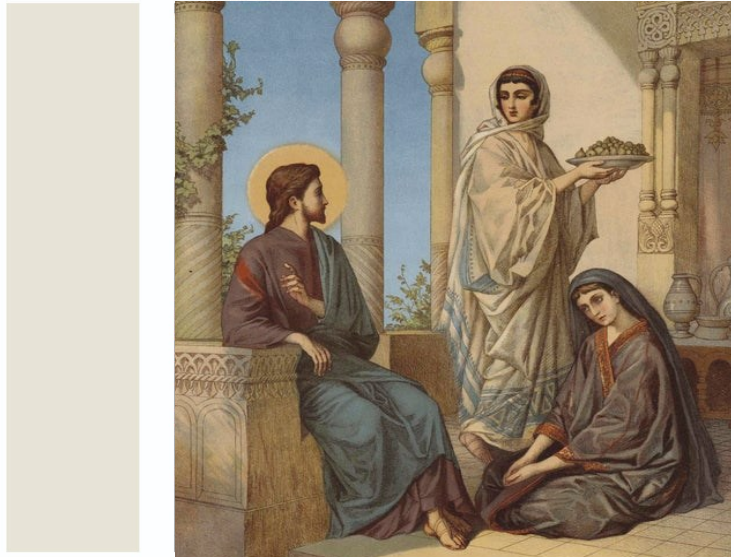

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## Gospel Meditation

### Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

One of my close friends is a hermit priest who lives on a desert mountain. Recently I found myself in a group conversation about him. One vehemently objected, “What does he do up there all day? Nothing! Priests are down here working, running parishes, making a difference, and he... he is doing nothing! What a waste.” The words dripped with indignation and resentment. Most of the group quietly nodded in silent agreement. Were they correct?

No! To see why, consider a similar scenario in this week’s Gospel. Jesus visits his friends Martha and Mary. A hardworking and exasperated Martha complains to Jesus that her sister is attending to him rather than to urgent household tasks. Our Lord, rather than praising hospitality, explicitly celebrates the less-productive sister for doing the **“one necessary thing.”** He praises her for she **“has chosen the better part”** (Luke 10:42). Mary is busy doing what matters.

Before we freak out like Martha, consider that all work — domestic, manual, professional, ministerial, contemplative — is done to help us (sooner or later) to experience the love that makes us happy. We should be thankful for those who focus on the “better part” of radical, ceaseless prayer. They invite us to remember the purpose of all work is the enjoyment of love. Contemplatives, hermits, anyone fervently committed to prayer—they invite us to cast aside our forgetful, resentful, and self-aggrandizing attitudes in exchange for hearts ready to do what is finally necessary.

Paul found reasons to rejoice despite suffering for his faith in Christ and his mission to the Gentiles. How do you find joy and hope in difficult situations?

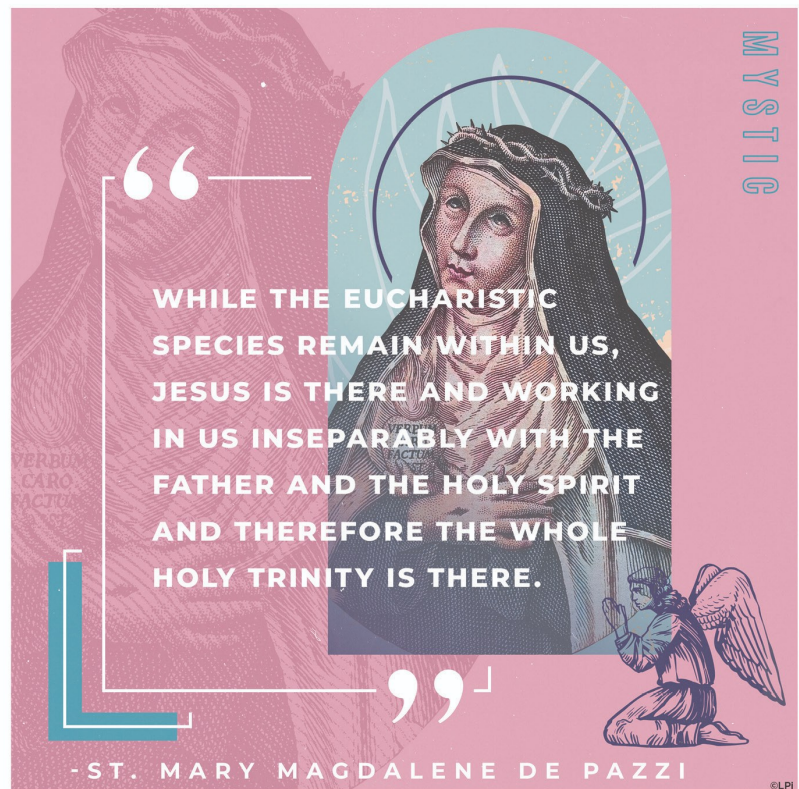
### Gospel:

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## (PRACTICING) CATHOLIC

**Mini Reflection:** Are you anxious about many things? Then you need to be right where Mary is: at the feet of Jesus, with all your burdens.

### Martha's Burdens

It's time to admit it: I've been unfair to Mary in the past. Been a little catty about her. *Oooh, Mary, she's so holy.* Well, do you like to eat, Mary? Who made your lunch? Yeah, that's right: it was Martha. Because you know what? It's the Marthas who get things done in the world while the Marys lounge around reading Aquinas and attending silent retreats and going to Eucharistic Adoration whenever they want.

And there you have it, folks: my bitterness on full display! I tend to identify with Martha, not with Mary, and I need to stop doing that.

Because I am not Martha instead of Mary. I am both. We are all both.

Mary was a woman; she was expected to do the serving, too. She shared that burden; she wasn't abandoning it, heaping her portion on Martha. And it's so wrong to assume that Mary didn't have the same cares and anxieties as Martha — perhaps she even had more!

Here's the difference: Mary, unlike Martha (and me, I guess) knew where to go with them.

We typically see our burdens as an impediment to a relationship with Christ. *I'm so busy. I'm so overwhelmed. There are so many demands on me, on my time, on my person, on my finances. Take a number, Jesus. Get in line.* But we're thinking the wrong way. Burdens aren't an obstacle that stands between us and Christ. Burdens are the straightest path to his feet.

God knows about burdens, okay? Aside from being all-wise and all-knowing, he basically completed a doctorate in suffering, taking on a human form (itself kind of a burden, if you think about it) and for 33 years lived among the hardest and heaviest burdens this world has to offer.

Why did he do this? Well, part of the reason was so that we could finally understand that our burdens aren't a barrier between us and God. On the contrary, they connect us to him.

Are you anxious about many things? Then you need to be right where Mary is: at the feet of Jesus, with all your burdens.

## Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

### Question:

July 22 is the feast of Mary Magdalene. I've heard a lot of stories about her, but who was she really?

### Answer:

Mary Magdalene has been the subject of speculation and scholarship over the last 2,000 years. Mary Magdalene makes her first named appearance in Luke 8:2. She is one of several women following Jesus. Luke specifically mentions that Mary had previously been delivered from demonic possession. Whatever her life looked like before she met Jesus, it wasn't good! Because of this association with being a repentant sinner, Mary Magdalene has been associated with other similar stories in the Gospel, such as the woman caught in adultery or the woman who bathes Jesus' feet with her tears.

Mary Magdalene shows up again by name at the end of the Gospels, when she stands with the Blessed Virgin Mary at the foot of the Cross. Mary is also present in the garden of the resurrection. She is one of the women who goes to bring spices to Jesus' tomb, where they find the stone rolled away. Mary stays in the garden weeping, believing his body has been stolen. Jesus approaches her and calls her by name, and she becomes the first witness to the resurrection! While many of the details of Mary Magdalene's life have been lost to time, she is an example of powerful conversion, deep faith, and intimate love for Christ.

### → MONTHLY SYNOPSIS ←

*July 2025 – July is the month where we celebrate our independence as a nation. Our nation has a strongly Christian founding, and we know that “where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is freedom” (2 Cor 3:17). Our reflections this month are intended to remind us that the Holy Spirit is the source of all good things in our lives and in our families.*

## PRAYER TO THE HOLY SPIRIT

Jesus told His disciples that whoever prays for *the gift of the Holy Spirit* will always receive what he asks for: “If you then, who are wicked, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will the Father in heaven give the holy Spirit to those who ask him?” (Luke 11:13).

Since the Day of Pentecost, the Church has been devoted to praying for the coming of the Holy Spirit, not only into our hearts and minds, but also into the Church and the world. We call to Him with fervor – “Come, Holy Spirit!” – as if we cannot wait for God to rescue us from the problems of this world. The marvelous Prayer to the Holy Spirit is one of the most heartfelt prayers of the faithful because it is a prayer for God to transform us and the world.

This prayer may already be familiar to you. Here it is in all its simplicity and beauty:

### THE PRAYER TO THE HOLY SPIRIT

*Come, O Holy Spirit! Fill the hearts of your faithful and enkindle in them the fire of your love. Send forth your Spirit, and they shall be created. And you shall renew the face of the earth.*

*O God, who has taught the hearts of the faithful by the light of the Holy Spirit, grant that by the gift of the same Spirit, we may be truly wise and ever rejoice in His consolation, through Christ our Lord. Amen.*

We believe that the Holy Spirit is the Church’s guiding and protecting force until the end of time. The Holy Spirit Prayer recognizes the roles that the Holy Spirit plays in the life of believers: He “fills [our] hearts”, he “enkindles” our love, he “enlightens” our minds, He “instructs,” “creates,” and “renews” us, and He is the source of all spiritual gifts.

There is no better prayer to pray on a daily basis than the Prayer to the Holy Spirit. This marvelous prayer is easy to memorize, and when you do, make a habit of saying it every day so that the Holy Spirit will be your constant companion in all the trials and joys of life.

“If only they knew we can still get texts up here.”



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## SPIRITUAL CHALLENGE

Let us challenge ourselves this month to call on the Holy Spirit to help us and our families in all our needs. When we invoke the Holy Spirit, particularly in times of trouble, the Spirit helps and renews us in many tangible ways. God the Holy Spirit always comes to those who ask.





### The 7 Gifts of the Holy Spirit

Our Lady and the Apostles prayed for nine days before Pentecost that the "promise of the Father" (Acts 1:4) would come upon them and fill them with divine life. We too await for the Holy Spirit prior to Pentecost and ask for His seven-fold gift from on high.

Our belief in the Gifts of the Holy Spirit is based primarily upon one passage of the Old Testament, Isaiah 11:2, which lists six spiritual gifts. To this list the Church adds "piety", which is the virtue of devotion. God's gift of the Holy Spirit is, therefore, seven gifts in one: the Church usually calls Him the "seven-fold gift" or enumerates them as the Seven Gifts of the Holy Spirit.

1. Wisdom 2. Understanding 3. Knowledge
4. Counsel 5. Piety 6. Fear of the Lord 7. Fortitude

*Let us resolve to pray for these gifts from on high every day!*

## Saint of the Month



**St. Kateri Tekakwitha (Feastday, May 26)**

Even though St. Kateri (1656-1680) was just 19 when she converted to the Catholic faith, she had heard about Jesus from the Jesuit missionaries to New France (Canada) and decided to dedicate her life to Him alone. She was baptized on Easter Sunday of 1676 and took the name Catherine in honor of St. Catherine of Siena.

Her short life of only 26 years was full of suffering. She contracted smallpox when she was 4, which left marks all over her face. Her whole family died of it, and she had to live with her uncle's family who were hostile to Christianity. After her conversion she was persecuted by her people and forced to move to a community where she could be safe from threats of violence. The saint's last words before she died were, "Jesus, Mary, I love you."

## Back to Basics



**TWO TYPES OF CONVERSION** – It is common to refer to a person's "conversion" as a singular act of repentance, but it is much more than that. Our Church believes that conversion is a lifelong process that has both a personal and a communal dimension:

**Conversion to faith:** When a person changes from another religion to Catholicism or changes from no religion at all to a life of Christian faith, we call that a conversion to faith, which for Catholics includes incorporation into a community of believers. We are obliged to share our faith with others so that souls may embrace the fullness of the Christian faith that we have in the Church that Christ founded.

**Conversion within the faith:** But faith is also a journey into the life of grace (holiness), so in another sense it is a life of constant conversion *within* the faith we profess. Our ongoing conversion starts with a rejection of sin and then leads

us along the path of deeper conversion from sin as we "grow to full maturity in Christ" (Col 1:28) as St. Paul describes it. This type of conversion may have many enlightenments or even a "reversion" (a return) to the practice of the faith after a period of time away from the Church.

Either way Catholics are either helping others to come to faith or opening our hearts to the deeper workings of grace in Christ.

*"One single soul...is worth more than the entire universe. But in order to be aware of this, we need inner conversion." ~ Pope Benedict XVI*



## Catechism Connection

**PURITY OF HEART** – The saints are distinguished by their heroic virtues, above all by their purity in body, soul, and spirit. Being pure in heart is one of the beatitudes in the Gospel of Matthew, which the *Catechism* calls a necessary condition for seeing God:

*Purity of heart is the precondition of the vision of God. Even now it enables us to see according to God, to accept others as "neighbors"; it lets us perceive the human body - ours and our neighbor's - as a temple of the Holy Spirit, a manifestation of divine beauty. (CCC, 2519)*

Those who are pure in heart enjoy the fullest expression of love of self, love of neighbor, and love of God.

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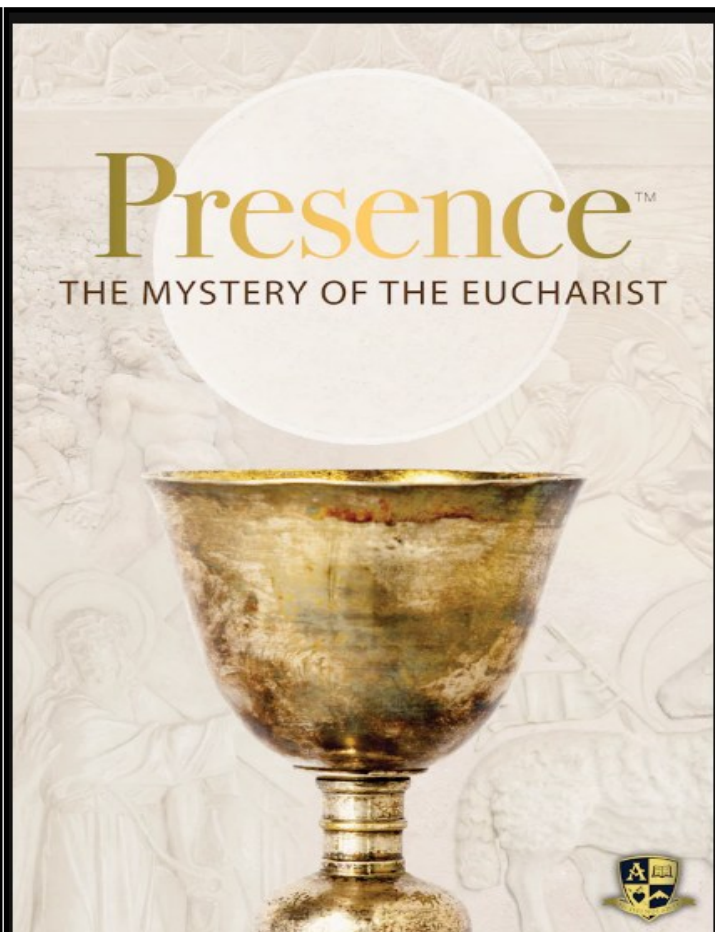
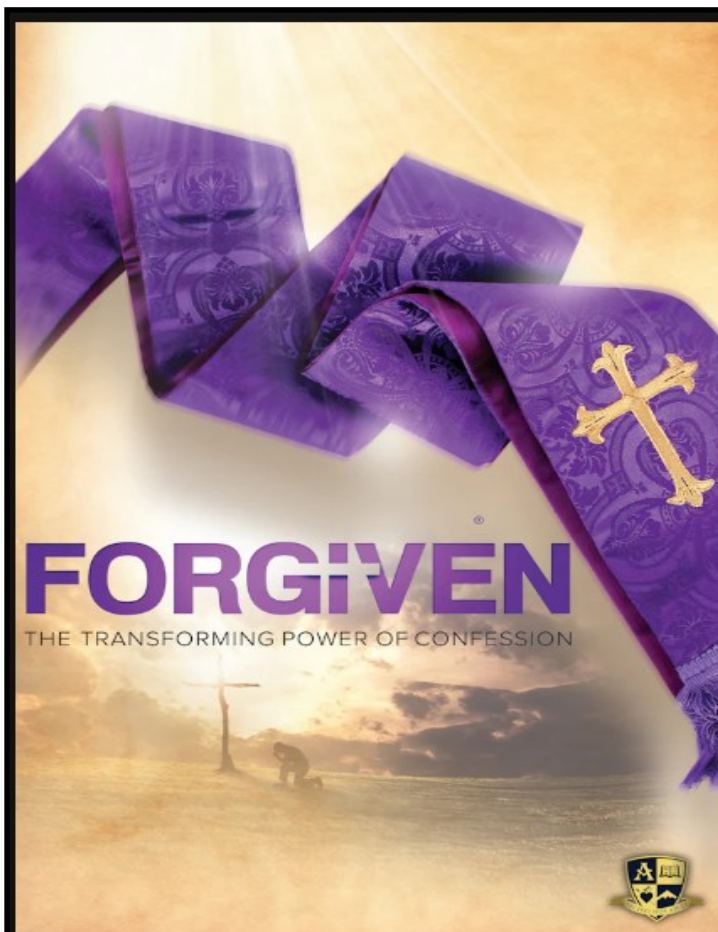


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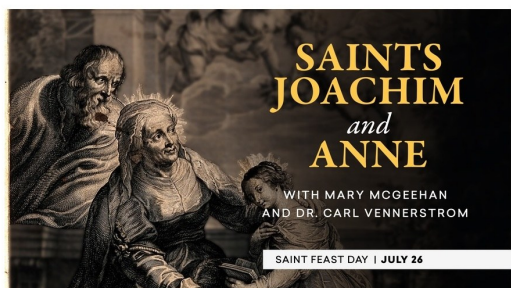
