




Women's Retreat at Subiaco

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Gospel Meditation Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

This week we hear Jesus say, "He that believes in me, has eternal life" (John 6:47). These straightforward words, uttered by human lips, sound — how to put this? — insane. Who could possibly say such a thing? Jesus says things that are so high, so demanding, so beyond our capacity to fathom, we hardly know what to do with them and (if you're like me), they usually go in one ear and out the other. So, let us ask: how can believing in him lead to eternal life?

To believe in something means not just to acknowledge its existence, but also to orient yourself entirely to it. If a football player believes in his team, it means he puts his life totally at the service of that goal. If a student believes in her dream to become a doctor, she gives everything she has to her studies and preparation for her MCAT test. Belief means to move boldly toward something we love, and trust is possible to attain.

What is the highest possible good at which we can aim? It is God himself, the gift of eternal life without end. Jesus has made this "good" possible in and through his human nature. To believe in him means to have him as our ultimate goal. This week let's believe the truth of these words and make practical decisions to orient ourselves toward what we see available in him: eternal life.



Murmurings

When people whisper, what they whisper usually is not flattering. It's also usually not accurate. If it was either of these things, it probably wouldn't have to be whispered.

"Stop murmuring among yourselves," Jesus tells the community in today's Gospel, and I think I detect a hint of impatience in his voice — or is that just my own bias? Maybe, maybe not. But it's true that what they were whispering about wasn't particularly flattering, and it also wasn't very accurate: *Did you hear what he said? That he's the bread of life?*

Do they disbelieve, or are they simply confused? Resentful? Afraid? Overwhelmed? We don't know, but we do know that they're not bringing their questions into the open. They're whispering them, trading them secretly, like contraband candy.

We know this guy. Who does he think he is? Well, if you ask me...

And then we get to what is usually the true purpose of a whispered opinion: the desire to make oneself out as the correct and unchallenged judge of the matter at hand.

In many ways, we have become a Church of murmurers. *Did you* see what Bishop So-and-So said to Such-and-Such newspaper? Did you hear what Fr. Whatshisname said in his homily? Who does he think he is? Well, if you ask me...

Perhaps it was always this way, even before modern times. Perhaps this Gospel shows us that this is no new thing.

Today, we see Jesus respond to his sulking critics by drawing their attention back to the truth at the heart of his teaching. *Everyone who listens to my Father and learns from him comes to me.* And that is the end of their murmuring.

The truth is like a brick wall, and it knocks them over - or rather they, hurling themselves against it, knock themselves over.

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Question:


I've heard that faith is a theological virtue. What does that mean?

Answer:

To say a virtue is theological means that it comes as a gift from God. St. Thomas Aquinas, a Dominican monk who crafted the famous arguments for the existence of God, wrote: "This alone is the true knowledge of God: to know that God is beyond knowing." God is transcendent. This word comes from the Latin "transcendere," meaning "to climb beyond." When something is transcendent, it exists beyond our normal range of experience. Philosopher Peter Kreeft put it simply: "God is always more."

While God created us in His image and likeness, too often we re-create Him in ours. We project our deepest hopes, our subliminal fears, and our hidden dreams, and conjure up our own image of what God could be. Yet God can never be limited to our own perception of Him.

That's where faith comes in. We read in the Catechism that "faith is the theological virtue by which we believe in God and believe all that He has said and revealed to us and all that the Holy Church proposes for our belief" (CCC 1814). We can know God through reason, to a point. As human beings, we want to know and understand the world around us, but God isn't in the world around us. He's beyond it. The best way to come to know God is not through our own clever mental maneuvering, but through trusting in God's revelation of Himself. We might think we know who God is, but the only way we can have any idea is if we trust, through the virtue of faith, who He has revealed Himself to be.




Open the Door to Personal Prayer

National Eucharistic Revival

Brothers and Sisters, this month we fully unite ourselves with the US Bishops in the National Eucharistic Revival and pray for the grace to increase our devotion to Christ in the Eucharist.

THEME FOR AUGUST: THE EUCHARISTIC HEART OF OUR LADY

Eucharistic Saint

St. Maximilian Kolbe (1894-1941). Few saints in the history of the Church were more devoted to Our Lady, but St. Maximilian's Marian devotion was imbued with a profound love for the Eucharist. Kolbe believed that *"Eucharistic Adoration is the greatest power in the universe, capable of transforming us and changing the face of the world."* The saint died a martyr in the Nazi concentration camp at Auschwitz, sacrificing his life for others, in imitation of our Eucharistic Lord.

Back to Basics

The Holy Sacrifice of the Mass is the very **Sacrifice offered on Calvary**. It is not a symbol or an acting out of the drama. It is the same Act of Christ offered in an unbloody way by the priest at Mass who stands at the altar and acts *in persona Christi* – "in the person of Christ."



The Catechism tells us that Our Lady's intercession for the sins of humanity originated right there, at Calvary: "In the Eucharist, the church is as it were at the foot of the cross with Mary, united with the offering and intercession of Christ" (CCC, 1370).

Teaching

The last of Pope John Paul II's fourteen papal encyclicals was on the Eucharist, *Ecclesia de Eucharistia*, in which he used a profound analogy to speak of Mary's participation in the Eucharistic Mystery. It's a stunning metaphor:

Mary also anticipated, in the mystery of the incarnation, the Church's Eucharistic faith. When, at the Visitation, she bore in her womb the Word made flesh, she became in some way a "tabernacle" – the first "tabernacle" in history – in which the Son of God, still invisible to our human gaze, allowed himself to be adored by Elizabeth, radiating his light as it were through the eyes and the voice of Mary. (*EdE*, 55)

Personal: Try to find time this week to sit in church or in an adoration chapel and adore our Precious Lord for a few moments at least. **Communal:** Research the Eucharistic Pilgrimages that will be taking place prior to the Eucharistic Congress next year and consider joining in. Faith Formation Companion to Prayers in the Pew™

→ MONTHLY SYNOPSIS <</p>

August 2024 – In August the Church remembers and celebrates the great mystery of the Assumption of Mary into heaven. She was sinless from the first moment of her conception and after her death was taken by Christ – body and soul – to reign with Him in paradise. Let us live this month in prayer and devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary, our Queen.

THE ANIMA CHRISTI


Among the many prayers that priests have composed throughout the centuries, one of these prayers stand out. The Spanish priest, **St. Ignatius Loyola** (1491-1556), was founder of the Jesuit order and a man who spent his life teaching people the value of their souls. His *Spiritual Exercises* is a retreat manual and privileged spiritual direction resource even to this day.

St. Ignatius' most famous prayer, the *Anima Christi*, is a marvelous spiritual reflection on the Passion of Christ. The title is Latin (translated "Soul of Christ") and is the first line of the prayer.

ANIMA CHRISTI

Soul of Christ, sanctify me. Body of Christ, save me. Blood of Christ, inebriate me. Water from Christ's side, wash me. Passion of Christ, strengthen me. O good Jesus, hear me. Within Thy wounds hide me. Within Thy wounds hide me. Suffer me not to be separated from Thee. From the malicious enemy defend me. In the hour of my death call me. And bid me come unto Thee. That I may praise Thee with Thy saints and with Thine angels. Forever and ever. **Amen.** Notice that the prayer touches on the entire sacred humanity of Jesus: His Body and Soul, as well as the Blood and water that flowed from His Heart. These elements are images of the Eucharist and symbolize the whole sacramental life of the Church.

The Anima Christi is also a very personal prayer to Jesus that anyone can pray with heartfelt devotion. It is also short enough for the average person to memorize! Together with St. Ignatius, we must ask Christ to save us from the power the evil one and to lead us through the problems of life to the Kingdom of God, where we hope to share eternity with Him.



SPIRITUAL CHALLENGE

This month, let us challenge ourselves to arrive at Mass early and spend some time recollecting our souls in preparation for the liturgy. Secondly, instead of rushing out of the church after Mass, make sure to spend five extra minutes giving thanks to the Lord so that we may reap the interior fruits of the divine Gift we have just received.

FAITH FUNDAMENTALS -



The Golden Rule

We're accustomed to thinking about "rules"

as limitations on what we want to do. But when we talk about the Golden Rule we must think of a "ruler" instead of a rule. It is like a yardstick that measures our own behavior.

In the Old Testament, behavior towards a neighbor was stated in the negative way: "Do not do to others what you yourself dislike" (Tobit 4:15). The teaching outlined a minimum requirement of justice: that is, don't hurt others.

The Lord's words in the New Testament, however, raise the standard much higher. We are to evaluate and do what is positively good for our neighbor, the way we would want them to do good to us.

"Do to others whatever you would have them do to you. This is the law and the prophets." ~ Matthew 7:12

In other words, we are to measure "good" and "bad" in our relationships by our own basic human need to be treated fairly. If it's good for me...it's probably also good for thee

Jesus calls his followers to love others as he loves them. Inspired by this call, Christians have shown his love through works of mercy such as visiting the sick and imprisoned, educating young people, and praying endlessly for others. Not only are these works of mercy directed to meet material or spiritual needs, but they are ways in which Christ draws people closer to himself.

In the Diocese of Amarillo, the diocesan criminal justice ministry answers Christ's call to visit and serve prisoners and patients confined to hospitals. Since 2004, this ministry has expanded to bring the Eucharist, Sacred Scripture, and prayer to inmates of the seven prisons and two large hospitals in the diocese. This ministry of mercy includes retreats during which inmates can encounter the love of Jesus, heal from past failures and wounds, and develop new hope for the future. Many inmates have experienced spiritual conversions that have inspired them to join formation programs and enter the Catholic Church.

The criminal justice ministry is one of many innovative outreach efforts made by dioceses supported by Catholic Home Missions. Home mission dioceses have small or widely dispersed Catholic populations, large or rugged areas of land that make it difficult to minister to the needs of the people, or economic challenges caused by poverty, unemployment, or natural disasters. Your participation in the annual Catholic Home Missions Appeal supports dioceses throughout the United States and its territories that need financial help to sustain core pastoral services and missions of mercy to those they serve.



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
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
