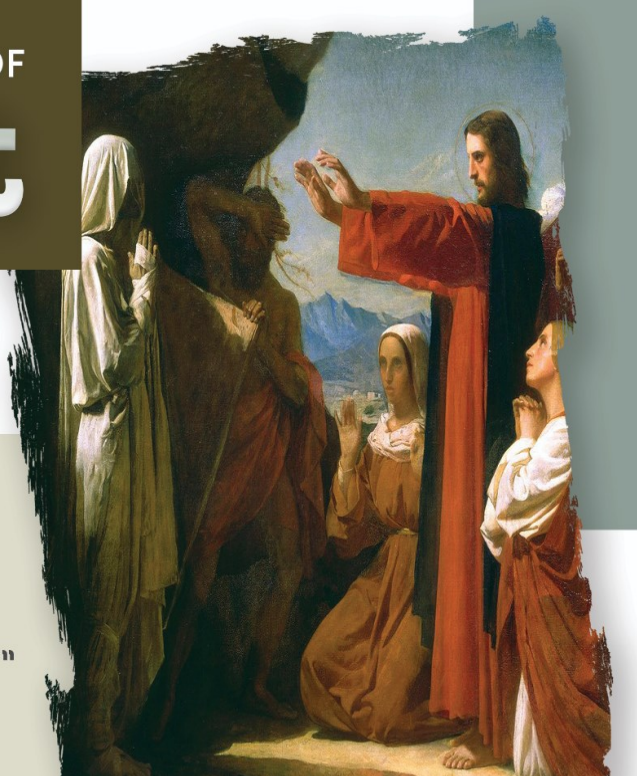

**Fifth Sunday of Lent
TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION**

Today, we know more about the beginnings of Lent than our ancestors did. We know that Lent is first of all about baptism, and secondly that it is about the desire of all the baptized to renew the power and potential of that sacrament at Easter. For centuries, this deep truth was largely obscured, but today documents have come to light to reshape the Church's thinking and practice.

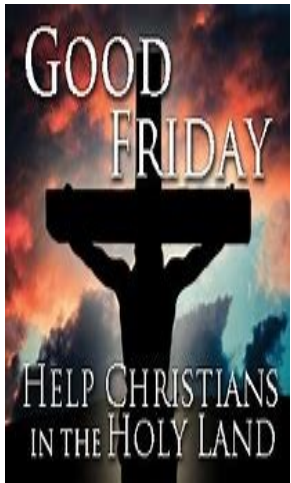
One source, discovered in the 1880s, is the pilgrim diary of a Spanish nun, Egeria, writing her sisters a detailed travelogue of a fourth-century sojourn in Jerusalem during Holy Week. She describes in vivid detail her participation in liturgies that are close cousins of our own Holy Week prayer, from a festive procession with palms to a procession to the cross. Her greatest delight is in the huge number of elect: men, women, and children who experience a time of deep retreat and identification with Christ's cross, guided by the bishop and supported by their godparents' constant nurture. The discovery of Egeria's diary proved to be a moment of grace for the Church; after a long period of "ecclesial amnesia," we know at last that baptism is really the work of a whole community of faith, convened by God.



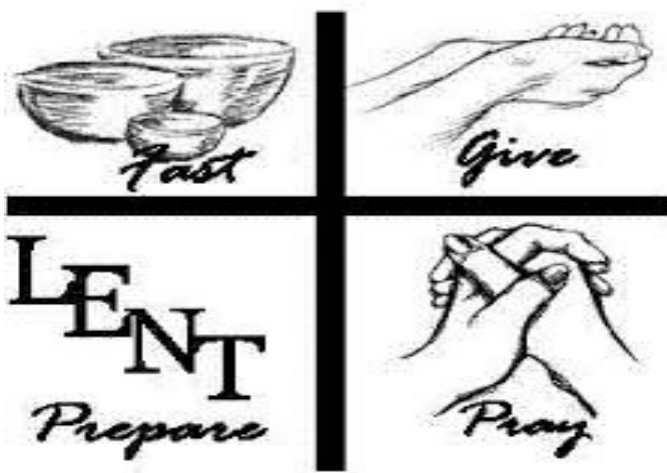

Fifth Sunday of Lent

LIFE FROM GOD

As we approach Holy Week, our readings speak of a God who, in the midst of death, brings new life to the people. In Ezekiel, we hear that God will open the graves of the people of Israel, who faced near extinction. In the Gospel of John, Jesus gives new life to Lazarus in a manner that prefigures the resurrection of Jesus. Paul tells the Romans that in Christ, God will not only give life to our bodies after death, but God offers us abundant life here and now. We observe that the external conditions for the people described in these readings did not radically change. Israel was still in exile. Lazarus would eventually face death again. But now God's presence and power are revealed. Even when our situation in life is difficult and perhaps not likely to change soon, we remember that the Spirit dwells within us.

OUR FASCINATING FAITH

In other words, we practice the same generosity as God, who makes the rain to fall on the good and on the bad and loves people without distinction. To help others is to confront the poverty of this world with the hope of the kingdom of God.

Charity is a Christian virtue because Jesus is the best example of what charity is. Charity is more than giving alms; it is love and justice. It is complying with the commandment to love one another in a world where most people are poor and abandoned. To be charitable is to give to the needy what they need from our time, talent, and treasure; it is to work for social changes that promote human dignity and the economic wellbeing of all. Charity is love and God is love. May we live in that love.

THE NEW LIFE TO COME

Death does not have the final say. This is the great mystery we ponder on this Fifth Sunday of Lent. Martha and Mary were good friends of Jesus. They did not hide their confusion and grief from the Lord; they voiced their conviction that if Jesus had been with them during their brother's illness, he would not have died. Jesus entered into their grief and more—he overturned it. Lazarus' death became the occasion for Jesus to show all who had gathered the mercy of God who cries out, "Oh my people, I will open your graves and have you rise from them." In this moment, the world was given a sign of the new life to come through Christ, the Risen One.

FROM DEATH TO NEW LIFE

There really is no way around it. Eventually, we will grapple with the death of a loved one, a parent, sibling, spouse, or dear friend. As we mature, we also begin to come to terms with our own mortality. Our Sunday readings this Lent have invited our reflection on the big questions of life and faith. We have resolved to turn away from sin and toward God, listening to the Lord and responding with open minds and hearts. We have acknowledged and perhaps heightened our thirst for the Lord and have committed ourselves to walk in the light of God's grace. Today, we journey from death to new life, reflecting on the mystery of Christ who is the resurrection and the life.

COME TO BELIEVE

Martha had a uniquely personal relationship with Jesus. She spoke with him honestly, baring her heart to Jesus, openly expressing her confusion and sorrow at her brother's death. Jesus' response led Martha to a deep declaration of faith, "I have come to believe that you are the Christ, the Son of God, the one who is coming into the world." We, too, can have a uniquely personal relationship with Jesus. We can speak honestly to the Lord, baring our hearts, expressing the truth of each moment of our lives, whether in joy or sorrow, happiness, grief, confusion, or times of fulfillment. In such honesty and trust, we may find deeper faith as well, coming to believe that Christ is our all, our way, truth, and life.

LA NUEVA VIDA QUE VENDRÍA

La muerte no tiene la última palabra. Este es el gran misterio que meditamos en este Quinto Domingo de Cuaresma. Marta y María eran buenas amigas de Jesús. No ocultaron al Señor su confusión y su dolor; expresaron su convicción de que, si Jesús hubiera estado con ellas durante la enfermedad de su hermano, éste no habría muerto. Jesús entró en su dolor y, más aún, lo trastornó. La muerte de Lázaro se convirtió en la ocasión para que Jesús mostrara a todos los que se habían reunido la misericordia de Dios que grita: “Oh pueblo mío, abriré tus tumbas y haré que resucites de ellas.” En ese momento, el mundo recibió un signo de la nueva vida que vendría a través de Cristo, el Resucitado.

DE LA MUERTE A LA NUEVA VIDA

Realmente no hay vuelta de hoja. Con el tiempo, nos enfrentaremos a la muerte de un ser querido, un padre, un hermano, un cónyuge o un amigo. A medida que maduramos, también empezamos a aceptar nuestra propia mortalidad. Las lecturas dominicales de esta Cuaresma nos han invitado a reflexionar sobre las grandes cuestiones de la vida y la fe. Hemos decidido alejarnos del pecado y acercarnos a Dios, escuchando al Señor y respondiendo con mente y corazón abiertos. Hemos reconocido y tal vez acrecentado nuestra sed del Señor y nos hemos comprometido a caminar a la luz de la gracia de Dios. Hoy, caminamos de la muerte a la vida nueva, reflexionando sobre el misterio de Cristo, que es la resurrección y la vida.

LLEGAR A CREER

Marta tenía una relación muy personal con Jesús. Habló con él sinceramente, desnudando su corazón ante Jesús, expresando abiertamente su confusión y su dolor por la muerte de su hermano. La respuesta de Jesús llevó a Marta a una profunda declaración de fe: “He llegado a creer que tú eres el Cristo, el Hijo de Dios, el que viene al mundo”. También nosotros podemos tener una relación singularmente personal con Jesús. Podemos hablar honestamente con el Señor, desnudando nuestros corazones, expresando la verdad de cada momento de nuestras vidas, ya sea en la alegría o en la tristeza, en la felicidad, en la pena, en la confusión o en los momentos de plenitud. En esa honestidad y confianza, podemos encontrar también una fe más profunda, llegando a creer que Cristo es nuestro todo, nuestro camino, verdad y vida.

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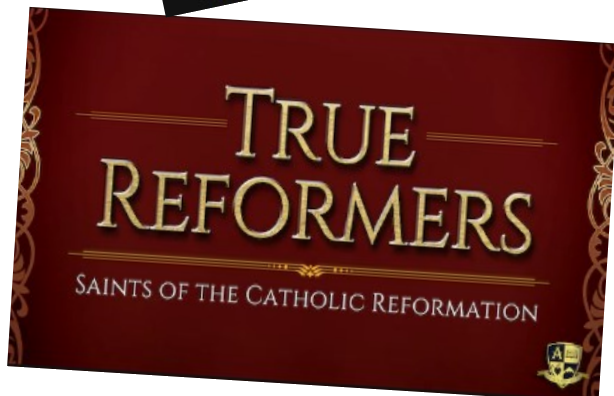
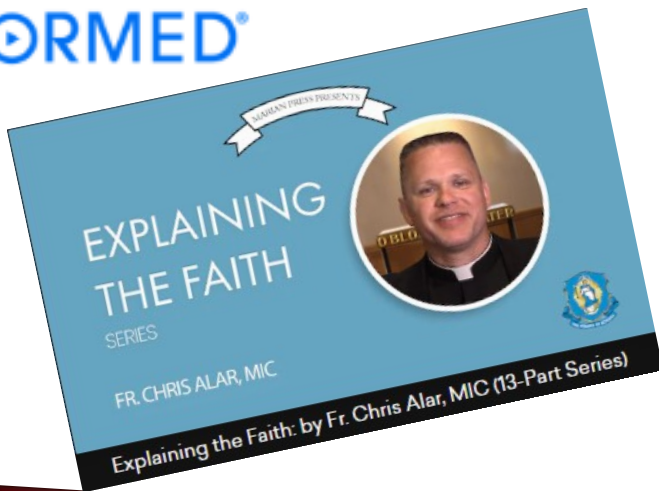
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The Hour of Our Death | Eternal Rest | Episode 3

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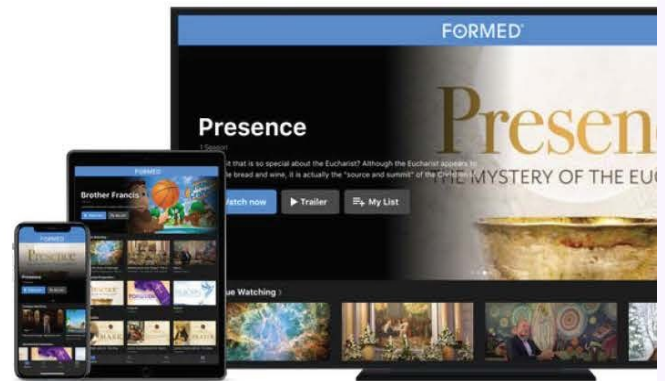
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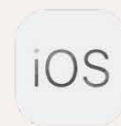
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
